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The President's Article

Proposed Bayshore Village Membership Research 2020

The Board of Directors has commissioned Jon Wagner for another round of Membership Research.

Previous Bayshore Village Membership Market Research was established to determine the demographics, qualitative, quantitative needs analysis and trends of the BVA member-

ship. Research is an organized effort to gather information about proposed plans and programs. It is a very important component of any business or organization strategy, especially with a volunteer base with limited resources. The most important by-product of the past research was the quality of the committee members and subject matter experts we attracted to work the issues supported by the membership as priorities.

We have included the same demographic questions in this year's research to mirror past research in an attempt to secure any noticeable change in the base segmentation of our members. That is where the similarity ends with past research.

In 2020, we will return to the guiding principles of our bylaws to form the strategic umbrella of the research. The objective of the 2020 research is to prioritize, foster and promote the interests of the Bayshore Village Association members and to maintain, improve and protect Bayshore Village Association common lands and other assets as a desirable residential waterfront community.

The Research will allow us to advance proposals or plans for the advantage of Bayshore Village Association members, secure a mandate to inform the members of the services and objectives of the Bayshore Village Association and to stimulate widespread support for Bayshore Village.

We will conduct the research digitally, utilizing software that can instantly populate reports and any segmentation the BVA Board requires. Since our previous research, we have significantly increased the digital penetration rate of email addresses with our membership which should help us solicit feedback and improve response rates.

Results and findings will be used to support budget initiatives and more complicated and costly programs, involving the use of reserve funds. To be clear, this research is directional in nature only and any significant investments or programs would continue to be subjected to all the approval processes required within our bylaws. This research will provide a more nimble vehicle for the Board, rather than waiting for bi-annual meetings to solicit BVA membership input.

The Research will be launched in May 2020 of this year, and the results and findings will be presented to the membership at the AGM in September 2020. At that time, we will solicit volunteers, as required, to enable and implement the plans and programs supported by the members.

I urge you to take the time to invest yourself in our great community by providing your valued input to help us manage Bayshore. Help us to continue to support and improve Bayshore and to build on all the past volunteers' and members' efforts as we move Bayshore into the next decade.

We share the sad news that Deputy Mayor, John O'Donnell passed away on Wednesday March 25, 2020. We were privileged to have John on Council for many years, and he will be missed.

Short Term Rental Accommodation (STRA) News

To repeat some valuable information regarding Short Term Rental Accommodations:

At the Committee of the Whole meeting on March 2, 2020, Jon Popple, Bylaw and Licensing Supervisor, provided an update on the implementation of the Short Term Rental Accommodation (STRA) Bylaw, passed on January 27, 2020 for Council, staff and guests.

The hiring of Jon Popple and administration costs associated with the STRA management were factored into the decisions made by Council and their legal department, including licensing fees and penalties. This will be cost-neutral, they say.

A company, called Host Compliance, has been contracted by the Township to monitor and collect weekly data on the top 50 Short Term Rental (STR) listing websites.

A monthly report is populated with screen shots and addresses of advertised rentals.

We are advised that licensed STRA's will be available to the public.

Host Compliance will also monitor STRA compliance and send out enforcement letters.

By-law complaints related to STR's can be made directly to the Township by telephone during regular business hours, at 705-484-5374 ext 242, or emailed to: bylaw@ramara.ca and will be investigated by Township Bylaw Enforcement Officers.

GuardaWorld has also been contracted to provide evening, overnight and week-end Bylaw enforcement. The GuardaWorld staff are authorized to enforce the bylaw and have the authority to issue tickets for infractions. Once again, if you are considering using your property as a STRA, make certain that you are fully informed with respect to your obligations and all the new Township regulations. Please contact Ramara Township and download all necessary forms that are required to be completed and are now available on-line, through Reach Out Ramara.

Emerald Ash Borer Update-March 2020



The 2020 Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) program, here in Bayshore Village, will be underway any day now. This program is fully supported by the Bayshore Village Association and will be implemented by volunteers. This means that we can offer this program at very low

prices compared to commercial tree services. We will finish the inventory between now and mid-May. This will be done by starting at one end of each street and working our way throughout the entire village, examining each ash tree and recording the data in a spread sheet. A small metal tag (with a number on it) will be attached to each tree. Please do not remove these tags. Since our trees were considered to be a very important Bayshore asset in our survey, we will be conducting the inventory on all trees without asking each homeowners permission. This has been agreed by the majority of homeowners. However, IF YOU DO NOT WANT US TO DO THE INVENTORY OF YOUR TREES, PLEASE LET US KNOW IN WRITING, EMAIL, ETC.

We are very fortunate that our Village is situated on a protected peninsula - surrounded by water, prevailing Westerly winds and vast swampy areas to the East. These factors have provided some measure of protection, slowing the advancement of the EAB. Last summer we had 3 small areas where the EAB was evident. Some of these infested trees have been removed and we are encouraging your co-operation so that we can save as many trees as possible by removing any tree that is identified as infested. Note that some tree companies in the area are looking for business and MAY tell you that vour trees are infested. PLEASE LET US KNOW IF THIS IS THE CASE AND WE WILL CONFIRM THAT THIS IS TRUE, BEFORE TAKING TREES OUT UNNECESSARILY. The life cycle of the EAB is very well understood. The adults emerge from inside the infested ash tree in May/June, eat their way out and create "D" shaped exit holes in the bark. This is the only time we will see any evidence of the EAB. They eat only ash tree leaves for about two weeks before laying very

tiny eggs in the crevasses of the bark on branches and the trunk. They generally only fly to the nearest ash tree, taste it to make sure that it is an ash tree before laying their eggs, and will not emerge again until the next Spring.

In the meantime, the real damage to the tree is taking place under the bark as the larvae chew "S" shaped channels everywhere, preventing the flow of nutrients to the crown. This causes the thinning of the crown, which is probably the first visible sign of distress. The larvae go through 3 or 4 moults during the summer, growing each time. In the fall, they form a pre-pupa which overwinters in-situ in a folded state. Due to antifreeze in their bodies, they can withstand our winters very nicely.

By the time there is any significant thinning of the crown, the internal damage is so severe that any attempt to then treat the tree is too late, or only slightly effective at slowing the inevitable death of the tree, and therefore not worth the effort to save it.

NOTE THAT ALL ASH TREES WILL DIE UN-LESS WE TAKE ACTION – THIS IS A WELL-ES-TABLISHED FACT.

The EAB has very sensitive taste buds. It will not eat anything else! This is the basis of our plan – make the ash tree taste bad to the EAB! This can be done in a variety of ways, but our plan consists of a very simple application of a special "fertilizer", applied in May/June (and every second year thereafter) until the EAB moves on. This "fertilizer" is non-toxic, natural and will not be harmful to anything in the environment. We will be offering to do this treatment for you at a small fee.

Compared to removal, this is felt to be a good investment, as cost for removals are typically \$500 to \$3000 per tree, depending on location and complications with respect to access, etc. As stated above, <u>ALL ash trees</u> will die in 2 to 4 years unless we take action.

We are looking forward to working with each of you in our efforts to save our ash trees.

Director of Common Waters



With the recent rain and warmer temperatures, Bayshore is experiencing that time of year when the spring melt and rain combination add concerns regarding water levels in the ponds.

I have been driving around the Village to see what the water

levels are, and the ponds are at levels

Keith Meadows of no risk at this time.

Thanks to Steve Goulter and the Stephen family, Vicars Pond is at a very manageable level due to recent pumping. I hope this is the year that Ramara finally resolves the Vicars problem and grades the ditches so this pond will retain a constant water level on its own.

The Pond Masters have not reported any other issues in terms of high water levels in their managed ponds, so it looks like we will get through this wet time of year with little or no major problems.

As we head into May and the installation of the aerators and bubblers, the pond team will be replacing two aerators with cost effective bubblers; one in Vicars Pond, and the other in Beaver Pond.

Also, in an attempt to lessen cost, the two 1 horsepower aerators will be replaced by two 1/2 horsepower aerators, saving Bayshore half the cost of hydro while having no noticeable difference in aesthetics, but perhaps a little less noise.

We have enough enzymes to last for a good part of the spring and summer and as soon as the new dye packets are delivered, we will again treat the ponds with dyes to reduce weed growth.

I will keep monitoring the beaver situation and, as long as we as a community take the necessary steps by wrapping our trees to prevent damage from beaver feeding and eliminate the food source, we should be able to live in harmony with our nickel plated, furry friends.

Our regular lineup, which includes Bob Plue, Eugene Storozinski, Wayne Perzel, Dave Renaud, Des Barnes, and Brian Hutchinson, saw additions of Kevin Fox and Brian Ivory.

We also put out an invitation to others who would like to try their hand and experience the enjoyment of this fun and frigid winter pastime.

Answering the call were Rick Indewey, Dave Horbay, Gunther Gratzer, Ted Spain and Vito Ilvin. Unfortunately, due to up and down weather conditions, personal schedules, etc., others had shown interest but didn't get the opportunity to get out this year. We will work on that next year for sure.

We are so lucky to have such an amazing fishery only minutes from our shoreline boasting some of the best jumbo perch and whitefish fishing anywhere on the lake. We had lake trout and pike caught as well as the burbot or dogfish. The odd bass comes through the hole as well as a herring or two over the course of the winter. Special thanks to Kevin Fox for bringing out his permanent ice hut this year. What a joy to go out onto the lake to an already heated hut with pre-drilled holes, stereo and padded seats!

Most of us usually use our ATV's, snowmobiles or UTV's to venture out onto the ice. The hard core guys walk out. We then drill about 4 holes (thank God for power augers), set up the portable fish huts, get the heaters going and we are ready for a fun day of fishing. The veterans, Bob Plue, Brian Hutchinson and Des Barnes have been fishing these waters longer than most and have discovered the "hot spots" either on shoals or holes and have helped the newcomers find success out there. Some of us found our own "hot spots" this year with tremendous success, such as Barnstable Bay which for some reason, was not fished much in the past-our



A day in a hut with a friend always has its memories and stories, from the guy who has his hut so hot you melt away pounds while sitting and fishing, to the largest fish someone had ever caught previously was 5 inches long and he had gone deep sea fishing! March was Fraud Prevention Month and given the recent developments surrounding social distancing and self isolation due to COVID-19 it's important for everyone to be aware of fraudulent schemes.

It is disconcerting that there are people around looking for opportunities to take advantage and prey on the vulnerable during stressful and uncertain times. Be aware, make smart choices with possible COVID-19 scams currently circulating. Private companies offering fast COVID-19 tests for sale, consumers purchasing large amounts of products and reselling them at higher prices, door-todoor fraudsters offering fake decontamination services, fraudsters posing as police issuing fines to consumers wearing masks and fraudsters urging people to invest in new stocks related to the disease are some. Watch for malicious email campaigns and fraudulent and deceptive online ads.

I, myself, fell victim to a scam last month involving an email from a friend asking for a favour and requesting I purchase four \$100 iTunes cards on their behalf. I was asked to scratch the back and email the number back to them. Not questioning, I stopped to purchase the cards and during the process was made aware of this scam. Prior to the completed transaction, I was able to call my friend confirming the scam which I embarrassingly almost fell for.

It is important to stress that it is your right to ask questions if you are feeling unsure, never make snap decisions-especially from those that apply pressure and, to challenge email requests to ensure validity. Make calls to understand how your service providers operate, correspond and communicate with you and know how your financial institutions and government agencies generally communicate. Whether speaking to someone over the phone, online or at your doorstep be mindful of the information you share before providing any personal or banking information or signing up for purchases/services.

When in doubt, call a trusted family member, friend, your bank, insurance provider, police or, in the instance of COVID-19 scams, the Simcoe County Health Unit to verify the person's identity and the service/product they are claiming to provide related to COVID-19.

These are your reliable sources of information.

Salad Recipes " to Put a Spring In Your Step" Zesty Quinoa Salad



Ingredients: 2 cups water 1/4 cup olive oil 2 limes, juiced 2 tsp ground cumin 1 tsp salt 1 cup quinoa 3/4 cup finely chopped red pepper 1 cup chopped cherry tomatoes

1 (15oz) can black beans, drained and rinsed 5 green onions, finely chopped 1/4 cup chopped fresh cilantro crumbled feta cheese (optional)

Directions:

1. Bring quinoa and water to a boil in a saucepan. Reduce heat, cover and simmer until quinoa is tender and water is absorbed, 10 to 15 minutes. Set aside to cool in a large bowl.

2. Whisk olive oil, lime juice, cumin, 1 tsp salt in a bowl.

3. Combine quinoa, red peppers, tomatoes, black beans and onions together in the bowl. Pour dressing over quinoa mixture; toss to coat.

Add cilantro and salt and pepper to taste. Serve immediately or chill in refrigerator.

Coleslaw- Great with Pulled Pork

1 bag shredded cabbage



2 carrots, peeled and grated 1 apple, finely chopped

1 small onion, finely chopped

Mix above ingredients together in a medium sized bowl.

2/3 cup olive oil 1/4 cup apple cider vinegar

1 tsp garlic powder

Dressing:

1 Tbsp honey or more to taste

salt to taste

Blend dressing ingredients and pour over cabbage mixture. Chill well before serving. Enjoy.

A Love Story from Gail Carter

Dear Friends,

We are going through some difficult times. Glen has suffered yet another of life's blows. A stroke. It occurred in October, just a couple of weeks before heading down south to Florida. I had every detail planned: Glen's knee injections, dentist appointments, eye exams, details for house watching during our absence, American bank account up to date, mail pick up, car maintenance for our three day trip south. Then......BAM.

A few years ago, Glen had been diagnosed with oncoming Alzheimer's. This on top of a chronic astrocytoma brain tumor he was diagnosed with twenty-five years ago. He was showing some cognitive disability, but managing to understand many details of our daily lives and to contribute to household tasks as well as the planning of our future.

On October 4, 2019, the morning was proceeding as usual: coffee and muffin and conversation. However, on this particular morning, our communication was pitiful. Glen couldn't speak well. There was no understanding, just confusion. He'd had his moments previously, due to the Alzheimer's problem, but that morning I recognized the situation had altered seriously. I called our GP's office. I was told to take Glen to the Emergency Department at the hospital. I was told the problem might have been caused by infection. It was early afternoon by the time I drove him there. He was tested, quite quickly I might add, and the diagnosis was Stroke. I learned later it had affected three parts of his brain.

I stayed every day with him in Soldiers' Memorial Hospital for the week and a half before he was able to come home. He was disoriented of course, under medication and slept a lot. The extended family rushed up to visit. They were so concerned, caring, and supportive of both of us. When I look back, I shudder at our vulnerability. I appreciated so much the rallying of support from family and friends.

When Glen was released, I was tentative about how I was to manage our days and nights at home. I cried a great deal. It didn't help, of course, but Glen, most of the time was, and has been, cooperative. Often, he's in a good mood. He does have what is called 'sundowning' symptoms which appear now and then. I keep our conversation and routines simple. Language has little meaning. Although Glen is able to describe fairly comprehensively incidents in his long ago past, his utterances regarding today's details are all ajumble- very

frustrating for both of us. Neither one understands the other. (I have made light of this, maintaining we have graduated into a more normal state of marriage).

Glen has always been physically strong and determined, even a stubborn person. He is trying so bravely to regain his former abilities. I am determined to help to the limits of my meager abilities. 'Patience' is the operative word.

LHIN contacted me with offerings of generous support. We have a physical therapist, a speech pathologist, occupational therapist, behavioural therapist and social worker. The VON offered an Adult Day Program for Glen, which he has clearly refused. PSW's came twice a week, each offering me a 1 hour respite early in the day. It was well intentioned, however difficult for me to accomplish any errands since Bayshore Village is some distance from Orillia. Lately, to my relief, the program has been expanded to 3 hour afternoon PSW visits twice a week.

How fortunate we are to live in a close, caring community. My Bayshore walker friends have been magnanimous in their offers to keep company with Glen to allow me to attend any appointments I might have. So far ,I have refused their kind intentions, however much I appreciate them. My tendency is to be independent.

Glen's 2 daughters have spent time with their beloved dad with pleasure and have provided me with some liberty to visit with friends and to shop. My son and his girlfriend have also given me wonderful support.

I have submitted Glen's name for admittance to a longterm care residence. I worry. Oh, how I worry. Oh, how I wrestle with my responsibilities and guilt. I want to do the best I can; to do the 'right thing'. I feel great dismay and disillusionment that our lives have come to this point. This was never going to happen to us. It happens to other people. The main thing for me is to ensure Glen's welfare and dignity. To provide for him opportunities to enhance his life. I understand that socialization is extremely valuable. As is Love and Care.
