President's Report



Welcome to the New Year, and I hope everyone had a wonderful Christmas with friends and family! During my closing remarks at the September AGM, I quoted John Lydgate, stating, "You can please some of the people all of the time, some of the people most of the time, but you can't please all the people all of the time." I was hoping to prove John wrong when

it comes to life in Bayshore.

Judging by the feedback obtained in our latest survey (which, by the way, had the highest participation rate ever), we've come pretty darn close to proving him wrong. But try as we may, I think the old 80/20 rule will haunt us forever. That is, 80% will be satisfied, but the remaining 20% will always see flaws and remain unhappy. But there's hope for the unhappy 20% if they were to do the following:

- 1. Become familiar with our Bylaws. I'm convinced there would be less negativity if there was a better understanding of our Bylaws and how they impact the various issues identified in the survey. The Bylaws clearly define what we can and cannot do, and how they limit our ability to address some of these issues.
- **2. Read minutes of Board meetings.**The Board of Directors meets regularly, and the minutes of each meeting are posted on our website, keeping you up to date on what the Board is addressing. Many of these issues, a.k.a. "works in progress" were identified in the survey.
- **3.** Understand who makes the call. I couldn't help but notice that many of the comments were a case of not knowing who actually determines certain rules, regulations, and initiatives.

Here are just a few examples of what BVA does not control:

- a) Pool Regulations: These are governed by the Health Department;
- b) Hayloft Capacity: This is calculated by the Fire Department and the LLBO;
- c) Ditch Digging and Park Maintenance: This is initiated by the Municipality; and
- d) Stop Sign and Speed Enforcement: This is handled by the OPP.

Many of the concerns the Board deals with involve municipality and government agencies. Throw in the local politicians, and I think you get the picture, that as much as the Board would love to resolve all of our concerns, it's an arduous and often frustrating battle to make any headway.

4. See the need, take the lead. We're all aware that volunteers are the engine that drives Bayshore. But there are only so many of them and a limited number of hours available to "get it done." Yes, many things could use

some attention, but there's only so much you can do with the hours available. So, simply put, if you see a need for something to be addressed, take the lead and organize a work group to get it done. Be the solution.

Overall, the survey responses were very positive, and I thank everyone who took the time to respond. Your input has given the Board clear indications of which initiatives to address. Our top priorities moving forward will include:

- a) Implement a phased-in retrofit of the pool and surrounding area;
- b) Designate a "Volunteer Coordinator" position to recruit and organize volunteers;
- c) Develop a suitable beach access point at Harbour 99;
- d) Bylaw awareness and enforcement; and
- e) Maintain current infra-structure; update where necessary.

In conclusion, I'd like to thank everyone who gives their time in keeping our community a wonderful place to call home. Without you, we'd be just another plain old subdivision. Cheers!

Hayloft Amenities Director's Report



Well, another wonderful year at Bayshore has come to a close. Despite some smoky rainy weather, the swimming pool was well attended with over 3,000 visits and a very late closing in October. The propane heater did malfunction late in the season which made using the pool much like jumping in the lake. The good news is that there is a

minor fix in the spring that will bring it back to life.

Future planning, budgeting, and obtaining quotes for the changes needed over the next three years is quite a task. Plans include installing a chemical feed system for pH and chlorine control. This will allow testing to be done every four hours rather than two hours as required by the health department. This will greatly relieve the volunteer time required to everyone's benefit. The cost of re-decking the pool area with a new fence is going to be very costly and may take as long as three years to properly plan and budget. There have been a number of costly renovations in the past four years to many of Bayshore's assets.

Ultimately a new heating system will need to be installed to eliminate the very costly propane system. The past year's seasonal propane cost from June to the end of September was nearly \$6,000.

I want to thank our lifeguard this year for his service. Kobe was a great help in getting the pool open this year. I received many positive comments from the pool regulars about his great demeanor. We are pleased to let members know that Kobe has agreed to return for the 2024 season. However the door is always open to any young Bayshore resident who wants to get certified as a lifeguard and have all fees reimbursed by Bayshore Village. If you know anyone interested please let the office know.

More on the good news propane front, we passed our ten-year tank and furnace inspection. The inspection did reveal small leaks at three locations between the tank and the building. They were repaired immediately during the inspection.

I am looking forward to the indoor events and regular users such as darts. For the musicians in the village, our piano has recently been tuned. Please feel free to tickle the ivories if you so desire.

As the season changed, we did have a wonderful turnout for the Christmas tree lighting celebration. Thanks, Jack for the sound system set up, so we could all hear the wonderful carols that were sung as the snow gently fell. A perfect night.

Here is hoping everyone had a very merry Christmas.

Bridge News Velma Burley and Noel Cooper – Organizers

Usually, eight to twelve Bridge players come on Monday mornings to play in a slightly different format than the Wednesday games. Monday players get a little less exercise moving from table to table, because we stay with the same four players all morning long, and switch partners among the foursomes.

One of the amazing accomplishments of the fall Bridge games came on September 25th, when Doug Sellery and Pat Beecham scored 3500 points in their eight hands together, including five "quick games" that each scored 500 bonus points. Pat won first prize that day, scoring more than 6000 points in total.

Most players would acknowledge that our total scores for a day are usually pretty mediocre, but scores between 4000 and 5000 happen quite often (13 times in the last few months), and scores over 5000 are rare enough to be mentioned in the Banner: Noel Cooper (5660 and 5070), Maria Saringer (5500), and Judy Kielly (5300), as well as Doug's (5210) and Pat's scores mentioned above.

The Wednesday bridge group attendance numbers have fluctuated this fall between eight and sixteen players. Now that the "Snowbirds" have gone south, we will likely average eight to twelve players weekly. The top score this fall was 4560 points made by Pat Beecham-Cooper. Patti Norris-Rigby was in second place with 4470. Judy Kielly and Velma Burley tied for third place with 4410 points each.

Helene Maikawa took on the challenge this fall to learn how to play bridge by attending Pat Beecham-Cooper's Friday morning lessons. She has proved to be a quick study and has become one of our regular bridge players. Well done, Helene!

We are always looking for more bridge players. If you are new to the game or just need a refresher, join Pat Beecham-Cooper on Friday mornings from 11:00 am to 12:30 pm in the Hayloft great room. She will have you ready to play with the bridge groups in no time.

Ireland: The Historical Island

My mum was born in Belfast, Northern Ireland in 1935. She often spoke fondly of Ireland and maintained a strong Irish accent her entire life. It was always my intention to travel to Ireland and visit where Mum grew up, went to school, and other locations she had talked about.

Our trip began on June 1st and ended on June 30th, 2022. Partway through the trip we embarked on a cruise to Iceland and then back to visit three ports of call in Ireland. We travelled to Dublin first, where we rented a car and drove north to Belfast. Our hotel was in view of the Titanic birth location, with my mum's childhood home not more than one kilometre from the Harland & Wolff shipyard. The day we went to visit where my mum lived, we walked the entire route. The journey had a peaceful air to it, and I imagined her at various locations along the way.

After Belfast, we ventured to the north coast to view the spectacular sites. As noted, we then embarked on a cruise out of Amsterdam for ten days. After the cruise, we joined a bus tour that travelled out of Dublin and visited many cities and sites in the south of the Republic. There is so much history within the island of Ireland. So many difficult times also. From medieval battles with Vikings and the

Romans, to the civil strife between the Protestants and the Catholics. "The Troubles" as they were known, were senseless killings motivated by the clergy members of both churches. The famine was horrific and there were many monuments reminding everyone of that time in Ireland's history.

Some highlighted points of interest were: the Titanic Museum, the heavily fenced and barbed wired section where the troubles took place, the Cliffs of Moher, Blarney Castle and the kissing of the Blarney Stone, Giant's Causeway, Guinness brewery, Jameson distillery, so many old castle ruins, Irish pubs, and perhaps the most surprising was Newgrange. Less than a week before our trip, I was watching a documentary on Ireland and they highlighted Newgrange. Newgrange was a ceremonial grave site that dates back to 3,200 BC. That is 2,000 years before the pyramids. I was so glad I happened upon this show. We booked an excursion to Newgrange on our last day in Ireland and it was amazing. I highly recommend visiting Ireland if you have not been there.

The boats have been wrapped and tucked away into storage, and the open-water fishing rods and tackle have been put away for the season.

IT'S ICE FISHING SEASON!!! Whoo whoo!

The ice hut was pulled out and inspected to make sure no "disco mice" or as they are commonly known, chipmunks, decided to make yet another nest inside.

The ATV has been started and all fluid levels checked.

The Lil Buddy heater and 10lb propane tank have been tested and propane topped up to full.

A trial start and run of the gas-powered ice auger, a must that this works, because hand drilling holes through two feet plus of ice isn't fun. It does build those biceps though. The smaller ice fishing rods and reels have replaced the longer, larger summer rods.

The new assortment of winter/ice lures is ready, making sure I have enough of my favorites.

Here are a few I recommend: Meegs in green or brown tones, Bad Boyz in the same green or brown tones, and my go-to lures for attracting the fish, the Little Cleo, lime green and silver, or the fluorescent orange and silver combo.

Everyone's "go-to" are Slab Grabbers, in silver or brass with an assortment of different colored beads. Either plain or tipped with a minnow head is killer and a must in your tackle box.

Sometimes you need to get a bit creative with presentation. I like to use a summer method just to change things up a bit. I'll drop a Mepps #1 or 2 Silver blade spinner with a small bucktail on the treble hook. Jigging this up and letting it wobble slowly down can attract many of the big or jumbo perch.

Another method is to drop a small tube jig with a float bobber and every couple of seconds raise it up and let it free fall to about one and a half to two feet from the bottom. Setting the bobber stopper to this depth is great as you don't have to constantly adjust the depth it falls to. Of course a live minnow (shiner) either jigged up and down, or attached to a bobber and hook, swimming freely, is always productive.

There are those who use the tip-up method when presenting a minnow.

Other lures to include are the Vibrato, killer for whitefish and lake trout, spoons of various colors, and larger tube jigs (salted/white is my favorite), to bounce off the bottom in deeper water for Lakers.

Rapala makes a wild assortment of winter lures. The "darter" series is very popular, but make sure not to have them close to other lines. Their name earns them a reputation for line tangles.

Remember, in winter ice fishing you can legally use two rods and if you are 65 or older no Ontario fishing license is required.

OK, all set now! Bring on the cold weather, the jumbo perch, whitefish, lake trout, northern pike, burbot, and those once-in-a-while lake herring!

Boy, we've got it good here. Now if a big school of winter walleye would venture through, it would be perfect.

I look forward to being out with the buds on the ice; there is so much fun and camaraderie shared by all. We look after each other and lend a hand if needed and we make sure we are all safe out there.

The special treats shared make this a great time, every time, from Finnegan's skillet-fried venison to Eugene's BBQ'd ribs and wild game sausage. Yes, we eat well out there. My addition to the "on ice" menu usually includes chicken drumsticks cooked like wings. Yum yum.

I'll end this with, "Please, please Mother Nature give us some good ice this year."

I can't wait to see you out there, good fishing folks! I thought I would add a few pictures of past on-ice catches, just to remind us why we do this.

MORNING MUFFINS – Heather Horbay

1 1/2 cups flour

3/4 cup whole wheat flour

3/4 cup oat bran

1 1/2 cups brown sugar

2 tsp baking soda

1 tsp baking powder

1 tsp salt

1 Tbsp ground cinnamon

3/4 cup milk

2 eggs, beaten

1 tsp vanilla extract

1/2 cup vegetable oil

2 cups peeled and shredded carrots

2 apples, peeled and shredded

1 cup raisins or currants

1 cup chopped walnuts



- Preheat oven to 350°F.
- Mix both flours, bran, brown sugar, baking soda, baking powder, salt and cinnamon.
- In a separate bowl combine milk, eggs, vanilla and oil. Add to the dry ingredients. Fold in the carrots, apples, raisins and nuts. Fill prepared muffin cups two-thirds full with batter.
- Makes about 18 muffins.
- Bake for 20 to 25 minutes until a toothpick comes out clean.

BLUEBERRY PEACH CRISP (Gluten-Free! or for a regular diet) - Diane Stoner

Saucy, crunchy, and full of cinnamon flavour, Blueberry Peach Crisp is a healthier way to enjoy comfort food!

Blueberry & Peach Filling:

2 1/2 cups blueberries rinsed (fresh)

2 1/2 cups pitted and diced peaches (do not need to be peeled)

3 Tbsps flour (gluten-free flour OR regular flour)

1 Tbsp superfine almond flour (optional)

3/4 tsp ground cinnamon

pinch nutmeg

1/4 cup maple syrup

1 1/2 Tbsp lemon juice

Crisp Topping:

1 Tbsp flour (gluten-free flour OR regular flour)

1 1/4 cup old-fashioned oats

1/2 tsp ground cinnamon

pinch salt

1/3 cup sliced almonds (optional)

2 Tbsps coconut oil softened to room temperature

3 Tbsps maple syrup



- Preheat the oven to 350°F and grease a 1.5-quart baking dish with non-stick cooking spray.
- Make the peach & blueberry filling: In a large mixing bowl, combine the blueberries, peaches, 3 Tbsps gluten-free flour, almond flour (if using), cinnamon, and nutmeg. Gently fold or stir together until combined. Pour the maple syrup and lemon juice over the fruit mixture. Gently fold or stir the fruit until combined. Pour the fruit into the prepared baking dish and spread it out evenly.
- Make the crisp topping: In a medium bowl, gently whisk together the remaining 1 Tbsp gluten-free flour, oats, cinnamon, salt, and almonds (if using) until combined. Add the coconut oil and maple syrup to the crisp topping and cut in with a fork or massage in with your fingers until small clumps form. Sprinkle the crisp topping evenly over the fruit.
- Bake for 27 to 30 minutes, or until the topping is golden brown and the fruit juice bubbles.







Bayshore Reads: ROAR



ROAR by Shelley Thompson (Vagrant Press, an imprint of Nimbus Publishing, Halifax NS) https://nimbus.ca/store/ roar.html

ROAR is a thoughtful, sensitive novel about a relatively new reality in our society: transgender people, who come to realize that their true sexual identity is different from what they were assigned at birth. I have a long friendship with the author, Shelley Thompson.

In mentioning this book to a few people in Bayshore, I've come to the opinion that several of us are aware of family members and friends whose sexual identity is more complex than the simple male/female alternative that we grew up with.

ROAR is the story of Dawn, who grew up on a dairy farm in Nova Scotia as Don MacInnes, who left home to deal with her changing self-understanding, and who returns to her roots in order to attend her mother's funeral. It's Dawn's story, but it's also the story of her dad John Andrew, a traditional father who has to deal with the loss of his wife Miranda and the unexpected new status of his daughter, Dawn. Also returning to the family homestead is Dawn's sister Tammy, who lives in Toronto with her Black fiancé, Byron. Of course, the whole town becomes aware of the family's evolution. Many of them loved Miranda and accept the transition of Dawn; many don't quite know how to react; others are cruel and vindictive.

The key to the development of John Andrew is Dawn's dedication to revive a rusting old Ford Jubilee tractor which her mother loved, and which has been disintegrating in the corner of a shed for many years. John Andrew goes from silently staring out the window, through bungled attempts at conversation, to trying to make peace with Dawn; he tells about what the old tractor meant to him (and why he hated it!), but eventually he decides to help Dawn revive the old engine, paint the tractor bright and shiny, and enter it in a contest of the local 4-H Club.

The novel tells of human emotions and reactions to change, in a gentle but sometimes wrenching way. It's worth a read, if only to help us understand one of the challenging issues of our time.

I met Shelley Thompson and her husband Ed Thomason when they were working in Toronto more than 30 years ago. Shelley is an actor who grew up in Calgary and was once nominated for a Dora Mavor Moore award; Ed is a screenwriter originally from England, who won a Gemini for "Gentle Sinners."

In 1989, Shelley took my young family backstage at a theatre in London's West End, where she had been starring in a production of "Me and My Girl." After some years working in Toronto and England, the couple moved to Nova Scotia, where Ed served as head of the Drama department at



St. Francis Xavier University in Antigonish. Shelley acted in numerous productions, including Shakespeare at the Atlantic Theatre festival in Wolfville. You may recognize her photo, because for nine years she had a recurring role as Barb Lahey in Trailer Park Boys. Shelley is now 64 years old – almost a senior!

Their child, born as Molly in 1994, was an award-winning teenage musician in Atlantic Canada, and transitioned in 2015 to become T. Thomason. I'm proud to say that my son Paul and his wife Sarah (with their young family) offered their home as accommodation to T. when he came to Toronto for transition surgery. T. Thomason is now a successful trans musician, who has played Hugh's Room in Toronto; in 2018, T. won "The Launch" on CTV, singing a song called "Hope" and bringing Sarah McLaughlin to tears.

Recently, T. wrote that he doubts he would have made it to the age of 28 if he had not transitioned when he did.

Shelley has been touring the Maritimes in support of her novel, ROAR, and she is planning to come to Ontario for the same purpose in the new year. You may hear about a visit to Manticore books sometime in the next few months. **ROAR** is already for sale on their shelves.

The Groom: Resembling a dapper "Michael Crawley" from Downton Abbey, the groom looked handsome in his morning suit and jacket.






