


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The President's Article

BVA MEMBERSHIP – 2016 RENEWAL STATUS REPORT

The deadline for renewal of memberships in the Association was December 31, 2015.

Members will recall that the board had approved a "one time – 30 day extension" for membership renewal beyond the date that was set out in the new 2016 Bylaws.

During the month of January a series of reminder letters was sent to a members who had not renewed their memberships, along with follow up reminder phone calls and personal visits and then a "Final Notice" registered letter was sent to any member that had not renewed their membership.

I am pleased to report to the membership that:

Registered letters were sent to all of the eleven owners indicating that their membership in the Association has now been cancelled and they have been asked to return keys and other Association items – golf and fishing tags.

The board also received confirmation from the owner of the ten lots at the entrance to Bayshore that have agreed to join the Association if and when the lots are registered with Ramara Township.

On behalf of the board of directors I want to thank all those members that renewed their membership in the Association and who believe in and support the future of the Bayshore Village Association.

SUMP PUMP ISSUE

The recent Ramara Township Committee of the Whole meeting dealt with the issue of the current township bylaw concerning sump pump discharge into municipal ditches across the township.

The Committee has decided not to proceed with action against those homeowners whose sump pump discharge is closer that the required five metres from the ditches.

Bayshore residents should consider adjusting the location of their discharge line if it is currently closer that the five meters required under the bylaw, to prevent the ponding of water and any related health issues and potential damage to culverts in the future.

SCHOOL SAFETY:

FLASHING LIGHTS, UPTERGROVE SCHOOL

There has been a concern for some time with regard to the parking and speeding on Muley Point road in the area of the Uptergrove School.

The township will be implementing "No Parking" on both sides of the road.

In addition, we have suggested to the Works Department for some time, to consider the installation of "Flashing" speed notice signs before, during and after school hours, similar to other locations throughout Simcoe and other adjacent counties. The township is prepared to install the signs to improve safety and allow the road to be used as designed during non-school hours and especially during the summer months. There appears to be some reluctance from the staff at the school as they would have to adjust the sign during special school events.

MUNICIPAL TAXES - 2016

The township is going through some very detailed reviews of municipal expenditures and the operation of all department budgets as they finalize the taxes for 2016.

Some members of Council, especially Councillor Sharpe and Deputy Mayor O'Donnell understand that tough decisions must be made with regard to expenditures given the limited revenue projections for the township, other that large pending increases in our taxes.

The township is struggling with "past decisions" of previous Councils that have created an almost unmanageable review process, reduced reserve funds, and left the township in an unstable financial situation.



2016 Pay raises

Council will NOT get a pay raise for 2016.

Staff Bonus will NOT be given out for 2016.

Staff will receive a pay raise of 0.9% for 2016. Councillors Sharpe and Johnson voted against this raise but were defeated. We voted against giving out raises this year because of the Township's Financial situation. The Staff work hard, do a great job and we really do appreciate them. I must add that they have been supportive and understanding about why we voted against a raise this year.

2016 Budget

At the March 14th Council, the budget was ratified.

Township rate: 10.54%. Blended with County: 10%. Township does not have the Education rate yet, but it should change very little either way. Your tax bill for 2016 will go up approximately \$41.10 per \$100,000.00 of your property assessment.

Ramara Township is in a serious financial situation! This has been happening for many years. Council and Staff must make some hard decisions to get us back on track. It didn't happen overnight to get us to this point, but steps are being taken to move forward to a financially stable township. Department Managers were asked to cut down their expenditures to bare bones, which they have. This budget had to be a NEED ONLY, not want.


Councillors Sharpe and Johnson voted against this budget, wanting to wait until the new Treasurer had an opportunity to provide us with more accurate information (hopefully mid-April), get into the books and get a better idea of where the township is going into 2016, what do we have in reserves, what is our debt, how much do we need to raise taxes this year to begin the journey back .

Council and Staff have had meetings under the guidance of Dr. Whitesell. We now have a plan for the future, we set a Vision for the Township and set strategic plans to meet that Vision. Everyone will work hard to implement these plans.

NEW to Ramara! County of Simcoe Rapid Response Unit located in Fire Hall Station #1 in Brechin

Began Jan 1, 2016. Hours of Service 9:30 – 7:30.

This is great news for our residents. This allows a trained paramedic to be on scene with a patient in a more timely manner.

Sump Pump ByLaw 2205-65 – Section 6.6

Discharge of water from Sump Pump/Eavestroughs onto Township property (ditches). The township will enforce this bylaw if/when plans are submitted for a permit for a new home build or renovations.

Advanced Green light at Hwy 12 & 47 in Brechin was investigated but will not go forward as it was determined that there is not enough backup of traffic when trying to turn onto 47 to warrant the advanced green. No news yet on the roundabout at Hwy 12 and 169.

NRK Holdings - Contaminated Waste Disposal/Processing Site

An Environmental Compliance Approval (Waste Disposal Processing Site) was issued for a Soil Bio-Remediation Facility located at 7406 Concession Road B-C, Township of Ramara.

Solar Projects supported by Ramara township

The Development companies had to bid to the Provincial Government and win that bid in order for these projects to move forward. None of the Ramara bids were accepted.

Strawberry Island

The owner of the Development Co. has passed away. The new owners have requested Simcoe County defer OPA18 until they review the plans and meet with our Planning Department.

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Much Ado About Not Very Much (with apologies to William Shakespeare)

As the play begins, we have residents of Bayshore Village objecting to an obscure bylaw that seems to make little sense when applied to their situation. While making a major renovation they have run afoul of an old bylaw that has been infrequently applied, if ever.

The bylaw reads, "Piped stormwater (sic) and piped discharge water shall not be discharged directly into or within 5 meters (sic) of a municipal road ditch." No one at Ramara knows when the bylaw was enacted, but 1996 and 2006 have been proffered as pos-

sible creation years. It seems pretty straightforward, until we are told that no one in this community has encountered it previously, despite many new builds and major renovations in recent years.

This topic was addressed by Council in the Committee of the Whole meeting on March 7, 2016. Mayor Basil Clarke supported the bylaw vigorously, stating that it was needed to prevent abuse and to protect the ditches. Deputy-Mayor John O'Donnell spoke passionately against the bylaw, particularly in this application, eventually proposing a modified version. Ward 2 Councillor Marg Sharpe also argued vigorously that the bylaw sought to control a problem that didn't exist.

The Manager of Public Works, Kathy Sipos, justified application of the seldom used bylaw in Bayshore Village with a list of reasons why sump pumps should not discharge into roadside ditches and a table of complaints collected over the past year. Most of the claims of possible effects are easily dismissed as opinion or speculation, with the stated costs attached perhaps questionable. Additionally, Deputy-Mayor John O'Donnell declared, "That's what the ditches are for, to take away excess water."

More than the possible ramifications of enforcement of this bylaw, I am concerned by the "them and us" attitude displayed by some council members and some township staff. Words were spoken to the effect, "The ditches are there to support our roads. They should not be pumping their water into our ditches." No one should have to point out the obvious, that home owners pay the taxes that pay for the roads and ditches and pay the salaries of all members of Township staff and Council. We know that this adversarial attitude is not widely shared by our hard-working Ramara staff and councillors, but it is disturbing that it even exists.

A particularly disputable claim put forward is that sump pump discharged water leads to heaved culverts. Since culverts are open at both ends, any wet ground around them will freeze before the surrounding soil and the culverts will follow the path of least resistance, up. This will happen with or without sump pump water discharge, as it is always wet at the bottom of our ditches and under culvert pipes.

The table of complaints used to support the position of the Works Department was a list of 29 calls requiring attendance by staff titled, "Bayshore Village Complaints, Ditches and Culverts."

This document is intended to indicate how costly the sump pump discharge issue is for Ramara. Unfortunately for that argument, only three of the 29 calls mention sump pumps as part of the problem and one of those should not have been included, as the sump discharge outlet at that home is more than 20 metres from the road-side ditch. Of the other addresses, one is on the south side of Southview, not in Bayshore Village, and another is on Old Indian Trail in Lagoon City. That leaves two stated sump pump issues, not twenty nine. Two. In a year.

Unfortunately, input from the public was not invited, so possible misinformation could not be challenged. When it came to a vote, only Councillor Marg Sharpe and Councillor Kal Johnson, Ward 5, supported the Deputy-Mayor's modified version of the bylaw and the motion was defeated.

After a very long morning meeting covering a variety of topics, at 1:15 pm the media and public were allowed some questions. Your correspondent took advantage of the opportunity to point out the previously mentioned errors in the documents supplied by Municipal Works, but of course this was too late to influence the process. How-

ever, after it was pointed out how important the issue was to affected residents, Mayor Clarke assured the room that the Township had no intention of searching out properties not in compliance and that the bylaw would only be applied with new builds and major renovations.

Since that simple statement would have defused the situation many weeks ago, it seems that the Township could have handled this better. As a neighbour asked in a note last week, "Should a disagreement with one resident lead to so much turmoil..." A few encouraging words from the Township, when this issue first raised its ugly head, would have prevented a lot of angst and wasted time.

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



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


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Book Review: Being Mortal

<u>Being Mortal</u>, by Atul Gawande (Doubleday Canada, 2014)



Being Mortal was recommended to me by a former colleague and his wife who said that retired people should give a copy of this book to each of their children – and that's what I'm planning to do.

Dr. Atul Gawande lives in Massachusetts; besides being an author, he works as a physician and surgeon and professor at Harvard Medical School. *Being Mortal* faces the inescapable realities of aging and death from the point of view

of a member of the medical profession. The author tells many stories of patients and family members dealing with declining health. The ultimate goal, says Gawande, is not a good death, but a good life – all the way to the very end.

Early in the book, he lists the eight "Activities of Daily Living" (such as eat, dress, use the toilet) and the eight "Independent Activities of Daily Living" (such as shop, prepare food, do laundry). In contemporary North America, if you can't do all of those activities without assistance, you lack the capacity to live safely on your own. Gawande disagrees with this basic mindset, saying that the medical profession should reduce its

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exclusive emphasis on specific health problems, and focus more on helping people to avoid loneliness and depression, and to maintain independence and the abilities that matter most in peoples' lives.

When people are no longer able to be completely independent, they may enter society's system of support services, many of which are dedicated to rules for patients' safety, at the cost of patients' freedom.

One of the most entertaining passages in the book tells about the innovations made by a man named Bill Thomas when he was employed by a nursing home in upstate New York. Proposing to management that they apply for a government grant for innovations in such homes, he suggested bringing green plants into every room, and vegetable and flower gardens outdoors instead of lawns. That was no problem. Then he suggested bringing animals into the home. State regulations allowed one dog or one cat in each building. Thomas proposed two dogs. Management said, "That's not allowed by the code." Thomas said, "Let's just write it on the grant application and see what happens." When the management committee agreed to ask for two dogs on the grant application, Thomas immediately proposed adding four cats. Then he asked about birds. "No birds allowed." He asked, "What sounds do you hear in the hallways of this nursing home?" You can imagine what kind of sounds prevailed. Thomas persuaded them to try for 100 birds. They won the grant with all the necessary regulatory waivers, and transformed the atmosphere of the nursing home. Bill Thomas went on to found "The Eden Alternative" and "The Green House Project" to radically transform assisted living and long-term care facilities for the elderly in North America.

Being Mortal goes on to discuss the most important issues that need to be dealt with by people whose health is declining, and by their families. Such people usually have priorities besides simply prolonging their lives. Their top concerns include avoiding suffering, strengthening relationships with family and friends, being mentally aware, not being a burden on others, and achieving a sense that their life is complete. Gawande believes that a quality health care system should deal with those questions with patients and their families. The book tells several stories about "the art of dying," concluding with a narrative about the last days of the author's father, who was also a physician. When he was asked about his biggest concerns, he said he wanted to stay strong as long as he could; he wanted to be able to type so that he could communicate with family and friends around the world; he didn't want pain; he wanted to be happy. His family did what they could to achieve his final wishes, until "no more breaths came."

Few of us would ask for anything more.

If you are older, and aren't sure that your family knows your priorities and concerns, I'd suggest that you get this book and then talk.

Milestone: Shirley Linton, Kundalini Yoga Instructor

Shirley Linton has achieved accreditation as a Level One KRI Aquarian Kundalini teacher in Dec. 2015. She teaches the Yoga class in the Hayloft on Wednesday from 10-11 a.m. from May to October when she in residence at Yoga teacher in 2014.

Kundalini Yoga, as taught by Yogi Bhajan in-

cludes asanas (postures) of Hatha Yoga, but also utilizes mudras (hand positions to guide energy flow to the brain), mantras (repetition of words or phrases generating sound vibrations), drishti (eye focus to stimulate glands secreting hormones), and pranayama (breathing to provide focus for meditation).

The course was taught by Sat Dharam Kaur, who is an accredited Kundalini Yoga trainer as well as a full-time naturopath in Owen Sound ON. The class met for a long weekend every month in 2015 except January and July. The classes were held in Toronto, except for the September one at Sat Dharam's farm in Owen Sound.

The course entailed 200 hours of lectures, Kundalini postures and meditation, and practice teaching. In the past two years, then, she has

taken over 400 hours of yoga teacher training. Students were also required to take 20 additional hours of Kundalini Yoga classes given by other accredited instructors (which Shirley had to take in Naples FL since there were none in the Orillia area). The students also had to participate in five Sadhanas, a practice consisting of exercise, meditation and prayer in the 3:30-5:30 a.m. period before sunrise. There was also written homework that had to be handed in at each class, and was based on required reading. The work was more difficulty in spelling and pronunciation for someone with a traditional Western background, since much of the terminology is in Gurmukhi, a Punjabi language. The final hurdle was a 3-hour in-class written exam. Shirley scored 97.5% (but as my mother would have inquired, "What happened to the other 2.5%?").

Kundalini yoga is a spiritual, not a religious practice. Shirley is also known to people in the Kundalini community by her spiritual name, Sahejpal (pronounced saj-paul), meaning a natural individual with relaxed spontaneity who connects easily with her spiritual side, and is a friend, supporter and protector. Anyone who knows Shirley would appreciate how apt a description of her character this is.

Unable to teach Kundalini classes in Naples due to US tax considerations, Shirley will be investigating the possibility of teaching classes at Orillia-area yoga studios in the May-October period of the year. And in the spirit of rock 'n' roll Van Halen vocalist David Lee Roth's philosophy ("A little ain't enough," or "too much is never enough!"), Shirley is considering undertaking level 2 of the Kundalini Yoga teacher training. At least once she's more accomplished in the Latin American Spanish she has started studying!

Trending this Spring, ladies: romantic soft feminine colours and styles. Butter yellow, Serenity Blues, Rose Quartz (Blush)



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

Here is a photo from a past Easter celebrations with our grandchildren at "North Haven" – our beautiful home in Bayshore Village.

Since 1999, Easter was always so special for Fred and for me, as we got to have ALL my family together, without having to "share" them, with in-laws etc. (like at Christmas)!

They often will arrive Thursday night, so that they can participate in all our Easter traditions: hanging eggs and decorating the garden (children-style!), blowing out and then painting eggs inside the house, and playing and interacting with each other! We have beautiful photo album records of each year ... many still with snow and ice on the ground.

Each Easter Sunday morning our tradition is, that we all – toddlers, tweeners, young adults AND parents too (!) – don the same home-made ears (cut-up stocking-cards with added pink inserts, on elastic to go around our heads - created 15 years ago), then they line up, youngest to oldest, each with a bow-decorated basket, just inside back patio door.

The children each get and read little rhymes (e.g., "You've got on your ears, your coat and your shoes, Hop out the door to find the next clues") and then they ALL bunny-hop, one at a time, out the door into garden! It's so cute to watch!

Then the first child gets a card, with a "clue." and the next and next child reads that etc., hidden all around the back garden – until the last "clue", which takes them all around to the front garden ... where all the treats are!

There is a bag for each child, scattered around the garden – plus they dash around and gather up as many as they can of the 400+ plastic eggs, each with something inside — a chocolate, a quarter, a few with a loonie.

Phew – this part only takes about 10 minutes to have all those eggs picked up! We take family photos outside, complete with our ears and eggs, and then back inside for breakfast.

And here is the interesting part: as the adults make the breakfast, the children empty their baskets into large bowls, and then equally divide up the "loot" with each other!! This makes sure that the younger ones get their fair share.

Another interesting thing: as they empty each egg of its contents, THEY CONNECT THE EGGS BACK TOGETHER, before returning them to a big box for next year!

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How To Test For Stroke: Three Simple Things

I recently came across this article about how to immediately tell if someone in your presence is experiencing stroke – three simple tests anyone can do. Many of you probably have read this before, but it is probably worth making sure that we are all reminded. I quote the entire article here, complete with references. The highlights in red tell the whole story at a glance.



Talk, Wave, Smile

A team of stroke researchers has devised a one-minute test that can be used by ordinary people to diagnose stroke – and the test is so simple that even a child can use it. Such an easy, quick test could potentially save thousands of stroke sufferers from the disabling effects, by allowing faster treatment.

"It is just three simple steps," says Jane Brice, MD, assistant professor of emergency medicine at the University of North Carolina–Chapel Hill School of Medicine. Brice tells WebMD that the test is based on a scale developed by researchers at the University of Cincinnati. The three-part test, called the Cincinnati Pre-Hospital Stroke Scale (CPSS), can be used to diagnose most strokes, says Brice.

Brice and her colleagues measured the accuracy of the test by first teaching it to 100 healthy bystanders. The bystanders then performed the test on stroke survivors. To diagnose a stroke, the bystanders performed the following three steps:

- 1. Bystander told the patient, "Show me your teeth." The "smile" test is used to check for one-sided facial weakness -- a classic sign of stroke.
- 2. Then the patients were told to close their eyes and raise their arms. Stroke patients usually cannot raise both arms to the same height, a sign of arm weakness.

3, Finally, the patients were asked to repeat a simple sentence to check for slurring of speech, which is another classic sign of stroke. "In Cincinnati, the researchers asked patients to say, 'The sky is blue in Cincinnati,' " says Brice. But in the study, the researchers varied four simple phrases such as "Don't cry over spilled milk."

Overall, 97% of the bystanders were able to accurately follow the directions for giving the test, says Amy S. Hurwitz, a medical student at UNC who helped design the study.

The bystanders were 96% accurate at detecting speech problems and 97% accurate at spotting one-sided arm weakness. They were less accurate at detecting facial weakness -- with only a 72% accuracy rate for this test. But Hurwitz says, "It is difficult to detect differences in the smile of a stranger. We are hoping that in most cases the 'bystander' will actually be someone who knows the patient and so an unusual smile will be apparent."

"This is all about time," says Edgar J. Kenton III, professor of clinical neurology at Thomas Jefferson University in Wynnewood, PA. Kenton, who wasn't involved in the study, says that clot-busting drugs used to treat most strokes can only be given within the first three hours after a stroke.

Thus, he and other stroke specialists constantly seek ways to speed treatment: "This is so simple that even a child could use it. Look at how many children have saved their parents by doing CPR, and this is so much simpler," says Kenton. He says he thinks the test should be promoted for use by the general public.

Brice agrees with this asssssment, saying that it could be like the Stop, Drop and Roll campaign to avoid burn injuries."We call it: "Talk, Wave, Smile."


