



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President's Report



With help from the vaccination process, we are slowly returning to a more normal use of our facilities including indoor use of the Hayloft. Vaccination verification is in effect at the Hayloft. Protocols remain fluid so stay tuned as we communicate any new changes in the coming months. Once again, I would like to thank all the health care

workers and essential service members that reside in Bayshore for their ongoing efforts in fighting Covid.

I want to thank the members for their participation in the recent Annual General Meeting and Town Hall. We will continue to evolve the meeting process including its recording given the installation of Bell's 5G network in the Hayloft. Hopefully next spring we will have members present at the recording session. We will continue to solicit voting prior to these meetings. Our overall objective is to maximize participation of the membership. By making the meeting available online we are making it more convenient for members to engage in the management of Bayshore and its affairs.

In October, the new board will begin the annual planning and budget process. We will review the most current membership research to help guide our activities. There were several initiatives that we could not complete due to COVID restrictions. We will pick up where we left off in prioritizing those programs.

There has been considerable progress on the capital projects approved by the membership at the May GM. Harbour 99 has had the new docks installed which will position us well for next year. We are having the preconstruction meeting with our contractor for tennis court rebuild this fall. That will begin on schedule and will be completed in early spring with line painting etc.

If you chose option #1 for your Bell TV and Internet service your second payment of \$1,900.00 is due no later than October 15th. Sooner would be appreciated. Let me be

perfectly clear. If we have not received your payment by October 15th, you will be removed from the preferred Bayshore/Bell customer list and will be charged a retail rate by Bell which is significantly higher than the preferred rate. Only annually do we have an opportunity to update the Bayshore Bell customer list. We are locking the list in on October 15th for this coming year. So please ensure we have your payment before the 15th.

The Executive are continuing to manage the sewage treatment issues and the Lake Simcoe Protection Plan associated with the spray field. This issue is directly linked to our high water bills. We will be engaging the membership shortly. We are laser focused on these egregious water bills and a proposed plant. Covid really hurt our momentum regarding these matters. With restrictions relaxing we are working to resolving these issues. We will send out to the membership a communication and our water bill analysis comparing our costs with other Ontario municipalities. Once we have cleared the runway on some other outstanding matters with Ramara, we will be looking for your support in October. Stay tuned!

Please join me in welcoming Kate White as the new Vice President of the Association and Doug Davies' return as the ex-officio to manage the Bell contract. All the other positions on the Board that were up for re-election this fall were filled by our very capable incumbents who have been acclaimed. Please see below. We will also provide a separate communication identifying the new Board of Directors via email to all members.

Have a safe fall. While we continue to return to a more normal lifestyle, we still need to honour the Covid protocols to get through these critical fall and winter months. Enjoy the freedom that all the easing of Covid protocols provide us. Returning to a more normal way of life and interaction will be greatly appreciated.



Hayloft Amenities Director's Report



The renovations to the Hayloft have been completed with the exception of some minor fixes with the saunas and lawn irrigation system. It has been nice to see some of the activities again inside, with the current limitations on occupancy. We have had largely positive feedback on the renovation and work continues with other upgrades on Bayshore amenities and assets.

Meetings have been held with township officials to approve access to the tennis court area, in order to prepare for the resurfacing of that Bayshore asset. The roadway beside the water treatment plant must be modified to allow access to the construction and material delivery trucks. Construction is to begin this fall, with completion in the spring of 2022.

The swimming pool did start off a little cool this year. Some of the early swimmers found the water quite refreshing. There were some small delays in getting both the solar and gas heating system operational in tandem. The previous year's heating bill for the pool on gas alone was over \$5,000 dollars. I do expect a vast reduction this year as solar was the prime heating system. I do want to thank the Torchia family for all of the excellent work providing safety and operational work at the pool this year.

A meeting was held with Elections Canada to ensure that the Hayloft could again be used as a polling station. As of this writing we are waiting to hear the results as our incumbent representative had retired.

I do expect that this winter we will have more options for use of the facility as vaccinations keep ramping up. However, income from the rentals for special occasions will still be very low to non-existent.

The past year has been filled with many challenges, however, I do think we are on the road to recovery and normalization of our lives in Bayshore.

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Director of Common Waters Report



With the vibrancy of the fall colours just around the corner, it is that time when the Pond Masters and assistants begin to prepare the ponds for their winter sleep.

This year for the first time our fountains (aerators) will be professionally maintained by Berry Electric Pump Service so that when spring arrives they will be like new for installation. It will be great to place them into the ponds without

any of the past troubles experienced by our volunteers.

Upon inspection I noticed the ponds in general look very good, though we had some instances where duckweed and millfoil invaded the pond. Spraying of herbicide and the new "made for Canadian climate" enzymes took effect and cleared up the problem. It was noticed by residents who abut the ponds that the water levels were within datum for most of the summer. In a few instances, after heavy rain the water levels rose but because of new drainage improvements returned to near normal levels. Though there is still some work by Ramara Township crews to do on Vicars Pond, I feel we are in good shape.

Going forward, our new supplier of pond supplies, Pond Perfections, will once again inspect and add their input on how we can make our pond water even cleaner and clearer. I will budget for three more bubblers to be added to Mallard, Golf and Duck ponds. I have had positive reviews from residents who have noticed an improvement in the ponds and we strive as a group to make them even better.

Another initiative I am looking at is to construct a turtle breeding area on Golf Pond behind green number two. While adding monthly enzymes and dyes to the pond, I noticed two Spotted Turtles as well as many juvenile Painted Turtles in the pond. Spotted Turtles are on the endangered list and if we can assist in their survival in any way, I feel we should do this. I will meet with golf course committee representatives, Marc Bertrand and Rick Indewey, to discuss this further and see how we can get this done and not only benefit nature but the golf community as well.

This has been a very positive year for myself as Director of Common Waters, with the addition of a new supplier of enzymes and dyes which are made for northern climates, a new maintenance program for the fountains (aerators) and two new volunteers to assist with herbicide treatment for ponds and harbours (Dave Horbay and Tom Hall). I work with a great team! Thank you Pond Masters, Jim Fielding, Wayne Perzel, Glenn Lucas, Randy Sinotte, George Miller, and assistants Brad Dutot, Joe Sokolowski, Ian Mead, Joe Latorre, Randol Smith, and Ron Joseph. Your hard work makes my job easy.

And remember as always, service to our community by volunteers keeps costs down, builds spirit and a sense of belonging to Bayshore Village. I always have room for volunteers and urge those new to Bayshore to ask "how can I help." I'm already looking forward to next year!

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Common Lands Director's Report



EAB: The "Emerald Ash Borer" program consists of "fertilizing" all 1000 Ash trees in Bayshore with a solution applied with a soil injector. Each tree is treated every two years. This year we did 504 trees. This is a very big program and a special thanks to Eugene Storozinski and his volunteer teams for undertaking this task. Most invoices have been sent out. The money collected will go

towards Arbour activities. The program will extend over several years, until the EAB leaves the area.

Tree Trimming: The stumps in the golf course were removed this summer. This area needs to be cleaned up as we are making plans to plant several trees in this area later this fall. The pile of wood chips has disappeared. Thanks to all the volunteers that helped out with this big task. Several other trees were trimmed or removed, and these were disposed of by putting them into a rental bin. Our hedges will be trimmed again this year - contractor and date have been assigned. There is a pile of firewood in Harbour 99 available to anyone who would like it. Please help yourself. **Arbour Plan:** A plan for all trees, shrubs around harbours, shoreline stabilization/naturalization, planting replacement trees, etc., has been created in response to the last survey that was done where residents rated our "Green Infrastructure" a very important topic. This "10,000 foot" plan spans at least 10 years. Detailed plans, which form the basis of the budget for next year, are available. A 15 foot blue spruce tree was relocated to the Hayloft from a residents property. Thanks to George and Marilyn Evelyn at 155 Bayshore for this donation.

Application to Remove Trees: If a resident would like to remove a tree, there is a form that can be used to request inspection. Our volunteer arbourist will come and inspect the tree in question. After inspection, an email will be sent to the resident with the recommendations. If it has been agreed that a tree needs to be removed, a lawn sign will indicate to others that removal has been agreed. This process is primarily used to raise awareness of how important our trees are to the community. There has been a flurry of inquiries this spring and summer about dead trees, especially birch. A few ash trees have had to come down, some due to EAB, some due to other reasons.

Beaver Monitoring: As part of the Arbour Plan, more attention has been given to making our Village less attractive to beaver. There is no point in planting trees and bushes just to feed the beavers! We thought we would have to install barriers to prevent beavers (and geese?) coming out of the harbours, ponds (and lake) onto common land areas. There were so few beavers this year that this was not necessary. I am not aware of any beaver damage to any trees or shrubs this summer/fall so far. There are several other ideas we have implemented, such as placing rebar (at 3-inch spacing) at the entrance to bank dens, etc., to discourage beavers (and muskrats). This was done in

several areas this past summer with good results so far. We are consulting with "Wildlife Management" experts to come up with other ways we can make Bayshore less attractive to beavers in the future.

Speeding/Stop Sign: We encourage everyone to go onto the web and enter an "OPP.ca" report if you witness a vehicle speeding or running through a stop sign. We will continue to work this issue. Please help to do your part in calming traffic by slowing down. Also, please tell your visitors, friends and work parties/contractors to respect our traffic laws. Please let me know if you experience road related issues.

Golf Course: A major rebuild of the irrigation system was completed last summer (2020). This year, we have implemented an "Oversight Management" contract with a third party to bring professional advice and specialty equipment in to provide some services when required. This will ease the burden of responsibility from our volunteers and should bring an elevated level of maintenance to our golf course. The new standby pump was installed this year. The old one is being repaired and will act as a spare.

Harbour 33 Parking Lot and Surrounding Areas: The culvert has been extended and the water pipe has been relocated. Armour stone has been installed along the edge of the parking lot and new planter barrels were purchased. A 20-foot flagpole has been installed.

Drainage/Ditches: Last fall, the Township attempted to improve the drainage path from Vicars Pond to Harbour 99. This did not provide adequate drainage this spring and the Township has agreed to come back and make adjustments. Vicars Pond was 10 inches above datum most of July due to excessive rains. It is currently well below datum due to pond residents using their irrigation systems and lack of rainfall. When the pond is high, sump pumps have to work hard to prevent flooded basements. We have not added any water in two months, trying to keep the level as low as possible going into the fall and winter.

Garbage Pickup: Our Earth Day did not happen again this year due to Covid restrictions. Please help with this task by taking a plastic bag with you when you go for a walk. If we all pick up a little, our community will look nice.

Flower Beds: It's mid September and our flower beds and lawns look amazing! Thanks to all those volunteers who create and maintain these throughout the village.

Contract Updates: A new snow removal contractor was negotiated this spring and the grass cutting contract is due for renewal this fall. The 5-year agreement with Clintar has been very successful and we will be renegotiating with them in the next few weeks.

Eco Park: The wood chips can be spread all the way around the pathway, if volunteers would like to help, anytime, at your convenience. There are no signs of beaver activities, so far. A task in the Arbour Plan calls for an evaluation of invasive species in the ECO Park and what action should be taken. A couple of the wooden bridges may require repairs soon.



Recipes by Diane Stoner

Four appetizers and a sweet treat just in time for the holidays! Enjoy!

PIZZA STUFFED CRESCENT ROLLS

- 1 8-ounce can crescent rolls
- 1/2 cup pepperoni
- 4 mozzerella cheese sticks, cut in half
- 2 Tbsp unsalted butter, melted
- Italian seasoning and garlic powder for sprinkling on top
- Marinara sauce, heated for dipping
- 1. Preheat oven to 375F.
- 2. Unroll crescent rolls onto a baking sheet lined with a silicone baking mat. Separate into triangles. Spread with a small amount of sauce.
- 3. Place pepperoni on the widest side of the triangle.
- 4. Place one half of a mozzerella stick on top.
- 5. Roll the wide end to the smaller tip of the crescent, making sure to tuck in the corners so the cheese doesn't ooze out.
- 6. Brush melted butter onto crescent rolls.
- 7. Sprinkle with Italian seasoning and garlic powder if desired.
- 8. Bake for 10-14 minutes or until golden brown.
- 9. Serve warm with marinara sauce for dipping.



BAKED HAM AND CHEESE ROLLUPS

- 1 tube crescent dough sheet
- · 3/4 lb black forest ham, thinly sliced
- 12 slices swiss cheese, thinly sliced
- 1/2 cup butter, melted (I use salted)
- 1 Tbsp poppyseeds
- 1-1/2 Tbsp yellow mustard
- 1 Tbsp dried minced onion
- 1/2 tsp worcestershire sauce
- 1. Preheat oven to 350F and grease a 9x13" baking dish with cooking spray.
- 2. Roll out crescent dough and press into approximately a 13x18" rectangle. Top with ham and cheese.
- 3. Starting on the long side, roll the dough up tightly. Pinch the ends together and place with the seam facing down. Cut into 12 pieces.
- 4. Place rollups into baking dish, evenly spaced.
- 5. Meanwhile, in a small bowl, combine the butter, poppyseeds, mustard, onion, and worcestershire sauce. Pour the sauce evenly over the rollups.
- 6. Bake, uncovered, for 25 minutes until lightly browned.

SALAMI, TOMATO, BASIL AND CHEESE SKEWERS

I used 8" bamboo skewers that I purchased at the dollar store. You can make as many or as few as you want.

- salami I purchased 3 types of mild salami from Orillia Bakery
- grape tomatoes
- bocconcini mini cheese balls
- fresh basil
- · pesto or roasted red pepper salad dressing
- olives (optional)
- 1. Marinate cheese balls and tomatoes in pesto or salad dressing. If the tomatoes are large, they can be cut in half.
- 2. Fold pieces of salami in half and then half again.
- 3. Assemble skewers: Slide a piece of salami, then a cheese ball, a basil leaf, then a tomato. Repeat ending with salami. I used three pieces of salami, two cheese balls, two basil leaves and two tomatoes per skewer. Olives can be added too.
- 4. Place the skewers on a large platter. Cover with plastic wrap and place in fridge. Skewers are best made the day they are being served. Enjoy!



LAYERED BLACK BEAN DIP

- 1 19-ounce can black beans
- 8 ounces cream cheese
- 2 cloves of garlic, minced
- 2 Tbsp lime juice
- 1 tsp lime zest
- salt
- pork seasoning or spice for flavour burst (cayenne pepper)
- 2 large tomatoes, finely chopped
- 1 cup old cheddar cheese, grated
- 4 green onions, finely chopped
- 1/4 cup black olives, pitted and chopped
- 1/2 cup sour cream



- 2. Spread black bean mixture on a large platter. Arrange a wide ring of chopped tomatoes around the edge, spread grated cheese in a ring inside that, followed by a ring of green onions, followed by the olives. Put sour cream in the centre.
- 3. Enjoy with crackers or corn chips.

CHOCOLATE COCONUT ALMOND MACAROONS

- 1-1/3 cups flaked unsweetened coconut (3.5 ounce can)
- 2/3 cup sugar
- 2 egg whites
- 1/2 tsp vanilla
- 1/4 tsp almond extract
- · pinch salt
- · 4 ounces sliced almonds, coarsely crushed, toasted
- 20 whole almonds
- Chocolate Ganache (recipe below)
- 1. Combine coconut, sugar, egg whites, vanilla, almond extract, and salt in a medium bowl.

 Mix well. Fold in sliced almonds. Cover and refrigerate at least one hour or overnight.
- 2. Preheat oven to 350F. Line baking sheet with parchment paper. Roll dough by tablespoonfuls into balls. Place one inch apart on prepared sheet. Press an almond on top of each cookie. Bake 15 minutes or until light brown. Cool cookies for five minutes on the baking sheet. Transfer to wire rack and cool completely.
- 3. Meanwhile, prepare Chocolate Ganache. Let ganache cool 10 to 15 minutes.
- 4. Dip bottom of each cookie into ganache. Place cookies on clean parchment or waxed paper-lined baking sheet. Refrigerate until ganache is firm. Store covered in refrigerator.

Makes 1-1/2 dozen cookies

Chocolate Ganache: Place 1/2 cup semisweet chocolate chips in shallow bowl. Heat 1/4 cup whipping cream in small saucepan until bubbles form around edges. Pour cream over chocolate and let stand five minutes. Stir until smooth



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Pickleball - Alive and Well in Bayshore Village

If Pickleball is of no interest to you, but you still have a heartbeat, please skip to the last paragraph.

Pickleball - The Growth Continues

And for good reason. What a fun game! To quote Karen Rust, President of Pickleball Canada, "Pickleball remains the fastest growing sport worldwide, with over 350,000 pickleball players across Canada. This number is expected to increase significantly in the coming years."

And so it is here in Bayshore. It was an impressive start to the year with 15 players attending my beginner's clinic, 12 of whom, an unprecedented number, continue to play. I believe this to be due in part to allocating three afternoon beginner playtimes each week. We now have over 40 regular players, a considerable increase over last year. Another factor could be the 50% turnover in Bayshore properties in the past 5 years, with often relatively younger people moving in. It is my personal hope that these new folks keep in mind that Bayshore is run by and depends on volunteers.

I would like to thank our visionary board of directors, and you, the residents of Bayshore, for approving funding for the reconstruction of the court surface. I conducted an online survey which included all court users and 74% were in favour of creating a pickleball four court design. As a result, starting this fall, the Tennis and Pickleball courts will be rebuilt with 2 tennis courts overlaid by four (up from two) pickleball courts in part to handle the aforementioned increase in player numbers. This is happening mainly due to many hours spent by Tom Costigane (and to a lesser degree, Joey Torchia and myself) performing in-depth research, planning and working with multiple contractors to determine the contractor with the best price/warranty bid. Thank you, Tom & Joey.

Our Annual tournament, the Bayshore Village Pickleball Classic was an impressive event. Twenty four players competed in the tournament. The top lady, a newcomer to Pickleball with only 3 months under her belt, was Kate Switzer winning 5 of her 6 games. The second spot was a tie between Laurel Dewar and Lynda Wyckoff.

In men's action, we had a tie for first place between Bill Merkley and John Simerson as both players won all six of their games. As we always play with partners, Bill & John flipped a coin for first choice of a partner from all the players present to assist them in their championship bids.

This resulted in a truly exciting playoff match. The game at high noon on a very hot late August day was electrifying. Merkley and partner Gunther Gratzer (3rd place) took a commanding early lead 4 to 0. However, Simerson and partner, Joseph Torchia our youngest club member, fought back with determination and some amazing saves, helping John to take over the lead, at 8 to 6. But 'twas to no avail as the combination of Gratzer's powerful hell bent to win shots along with quiet unemotional Merkley's impenetrable wall to Simerson's best spin shots allowed Merkley to forge an 11 to 9 win and moving Simerson to the runner up spot. My wife left me because I'm insecure... Oh, no, wait, she's back. She just went for groceries.



We decided to take Chip in after a few nights and we made a temporary home in a ventilated cardboard box and bought some puppy milk replacement along with a feeding bottle. We fed Chip six times a day in hopes that he would not only take to the replacement milk but gain some strength. The very next day, our neighbours Brian and Diane found another baby in between our two homes. They had to be from the same litter as it too had its eyes closed and was the same size as Chip. We gladly took him in and this became the start of the Chip & Dale adventure. They took to one another right away, cuddled to keep each other warm at night and after almost two weeks, their eyes opened.

They graduated to a "gerbil condo" where they stayed warm, took to the milk like troopers and started to play with one another. We researched and spoke to animal experts who told us we should keep them until they are nine weeks old at which time they could then be released. After six weeks on milk, they had graduated to trail mix of seed and corn and their special treats were blueberries and slices of carrot. They also enjoyed feedings of fresh kale.

Chip & Dale became very popular with family, friends and neighbours who joined us with live updates via Instagram as everyone wanted to know how the "babies" were doing. Even our dog, Finley, enjoyed seeing the "babies".

After nine weeks, we decided to release them out front of our home at 205 Bayshore and we had a "Release Party" with many neighbours present. They played along the front garden and we left the gerbil condo outside for them open so they would have a safe haven to run to. Needless to say, they didn't go far that day so we took them in for one more night. The next day, we attempted a second release attempt but when a third chipmunk came along and started fighting the babies, my husband, Brian, immediately put them back in their "condo" and we kept them inside for one more night. Attempt number three was successful and they seemed ready to take on their new adventure.

They are both thriving and we still see them in the front and back in their special feeding spots. We are grateful for the opportunity to do some good and save two baby chipmunks who may not have had a chance otherwise.

Chip & Dale are such a warm reminder to us all as we drive along Bayshore within speed limit, to be mindful of walkers, pets, animals, other cars and children. Bayshore Drive lately feels like a runway with speeding cars and trucks. Even the vendors who come into our community to service our homes, have no regard for speed limits. Slow down. Bayshore Drive is not a runway and the excessive speeding is dangerous. Quite simply – slow down.

Invasive Plant Spotted

(Excerpted and edited for space, Toronto Star article by Bob Bowles, Founder & Coordinator of the Ontario Master Naturalist program at Lakehead University) Several hours spent monitoring lakes, rivers and creeks in north Simcoe has made me realize roadside ditches, creeks and small streams are being choked out by a new invasive aquatic plant native to Europe.

I observed *European Frogbit* (hydrocharis morsus-ranae) in 2015 in the Kawartha Lakes region, where it now chokes out some areas. In 2018, I observed it in Canal Lake, east of Brechin. In August 2021, I found large mats choking ditches around Mara Point and creeks like Barnstable Creek, Waiman Creek and Murphy Creek in Ramara Township. It is starting to establish itself in Mill Creek and Broughs Creek in Orillia, Oro-Medonte and Severn.

It has a well-developed root system that normally floats free, spread by boats, recreation and wildlife. Plants form a rosette with a rounded apex and heart-shaped leaves which are green above and purple-red beneath. Flower have three white petals and a yellow centre. They grow quickly into large tangles that deplete oxygen levels, impact fish and aquatic wildlife, crowd out other plants, and restrict boating and swimming. It prefers slow-moving waters like ditches and creeks with mud bottoms. Care must be taken when moving recreational equipment to new areas to prevent the spread of this invasive plant.





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
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Bayshore Reads: Hamnet and Judith



Hamnet and Judith, by Maggie O'Farrell.

Hamnet and Judith were born in 1585, the twin children of Anne Hathaway and her husband, William Shakespeare. The names "Hamnet" and "Hamlet" were interchangeable in those days, perhaps like "Will" and "Bill" now. The boy Hamnet died of the plague at the age of 11. Four years later, his father

wrote a play, using the other form of his dead son's name for the title character.

In the course of reading the novel, I learned about the families and descendants of both parents. Anne outlived her husband by seven years. Judith lived to the age of 77; she had three children, but no grandchildren.

In this best-selling historical novel, Irish-British novelist Maggie O'Farrell has crafted an account of the family's life from before the couple married until after the famous play was written. Anne (who was known to her family as Agnes, and has that name in the novel) is the central character in the novel. Her husband is never named, though he plays an important role in the story.

Agnes grew up as the step-daughter of a farming family near Stratford, Warwickshire. Unloved by her step-mother, her father's second wife, Agnes has remarkable psychic and curing powers. She cares for a tame falcon, and loves to spend her days in the forest, where she feels in tune with the healing value of leaves and flowers.

Her future husband lives an unhappy life as the Latin tutor for a few children in the same rural town. His sometimes-violent father John is a glover (a maker of gloves) who was once a powerful leader in the town, but was accused of crimes (including refusing to go to church) and fell from grace to such an extent that his neighbours are not willing to sit with him at the local pub. The son is unhappy at the thought of being nothing more than an apprentice glover, and eventually decides to leave his family behind and seek fulfilment in London, where he becomes a rich and famous playwright.

With great perception in telling the story from Agnes' point of view, the novelist describes the smells, textures, and sights of life in 16th-century forests, barnyards, village streets, markets, graveyards, dwellings and eventually in the frightening and smoky city of London.

The book explores the feelings of Agnes, as a rural misfit, then as a wife who is part of her husband's family, the village healer, a deserted mother, and then the grieving mother of a dead child. She is distraught when she hears that her husband has written a tragedy whose main character carries the name of her dead son, and travels to London to experience the play.

This novel is brilliant but heart-wrenching. If you have ever experienced a tragic bereavement, you should know before you decide to read this novel, that this book explores the emotional depths of grief.

The book is a New York Times best-seller, and has won a number of prizes for fiction. It is published under the title "Hamnet" in both the UK and the USA. I read it using the Kindle app on my iPad. It is available at the Ramara Library.

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


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Kidz Korner

Stress balls are fun to play with and easy to customize! Here's how you make them: Materials

- balloon
- flour
- funnel
- markers (optional)
- yarn (optional)
- googly eyes (optional)
- 1. Blow up the balloon to stretch it out and then let the air out.
- 2. Insert a funnel into the balloon and begin adding flour. Don't fill the neck of the balloon.
- 3. Tie the balloon.
- 4. Customize your stress ball! You can draw on a funny face, add yarn for hair, or even glue on googly eyes! Happy Crafting!

To be honest, I'm still not clear if these are truly called biospheres or ecospheres, but making one of these is an excellent way to observe and appreciate the tiny creatures living in our water habitats that would otherwise go unnoticed.



Now is a great time to do this before the lake freezes. Get a clamping jar, a wine bottle with a cork, or an old pickle jar almost any kind of clear, air and waterproof glass jar. Mason jars will not work because they are not truly airtight. Get the kids to fill the jar from the lake, gently scooping the jar along the bottom, gathering up the sand and decaying matter. Include some moss and/or lake plants. Try not to gather any visible fish as they probably won't survive.

Instruct them not to shake the jar. Ever. And it's not necessary to open it either. Place the jar where it will be well lit for observation, but not in direct sunlight as it will heat up too much. The kids will have to be patient because nothing might happen for a couple of days while the sand and other particles settle, but after a while they will start to see see air bubbles of tiny lake animals and organisms and they may even start to see them emerge. Watch them grow over time. A magnifying glass might be helpful to view the progress of the project.

Discuss with your child how the moss and lake plants convert the C02 into oxygen for the creatures to survive. If they get any snails or scuds in the jar, these are particularly important in keeping the jar clean as they eat the algae and bacteria. Fascinating and educational!



Time to make some fall decor! How about making this festive "pumpkin".

Get about 20 mason jar rings and spray paint them whatever colour you want. Find some matching coloured string or yarn, and a couple of cinnamon sticks and maybe even some faux leaves for accents.

First, make sure all your painted mason jar rings are facing the same direction. Wrap the piece of yarn through the bands and pull tightly. Kids might need some help here. They can put their finger on the yarn as you tie a tight knot. Cut off excess. Once it's tied, gently separate the bands so they are spaced evenly. Pop a few cinnamon sticks in the middle to represent the pumpkin stem, and/or glue on faux leaves. Done!

This craft is a little simpler for young ones, and uses basically the same materials as the pumpkin above. Now that you've used all the rings from your mason jars in making that

pumpkin, you'll have all kinds of lids left over. Spray paint them too!

We glued three lids together and drew on some of them with a sharpie. They did their names for table name cards, made little designs, and left

other ones plain. On some, we attached a twig or a cinnamon stick for the "stem". You could use these at your holiday table as coaster or trivets, or just for fun. They were so easy to make.



Passionate about golf? Share that passion with the kiddies even though the season is drawing to a close. Recycle those Amazon boxes and have fun with this homemade putting practice game all year round with (or without) the young ones.



Here's a candle craft the kids and I did that can be made to suit any holiday. Get a battery operated candle, a decorative napkin, glue or mod podge, and saran wrap. Separate the napkin so you have only 1-ply with the image you want to transfer. Either cut a partial image out or cut the napkin to just fit around the whole candle. Lay some saran wrap on your table. Brush the candle with glue

or mod podge and carefully place your image on. Roll it up in the saran wrap to smooth out any bubbles, then discard the wrap. Let dry. A great gift idea!


