#### **President's Final Report**



This will be my last report as President of Bayshore. After serving on the Board for close to six years, I have decided to move on and rekindle my retirement in Bayshore.

Iamproud of the accomplishments achieved by the Boards under my leadership. Long before COVID, we embraced WEBEX internet meeting technology to operate

the Board twelve months of the year while accommodating vacationing Directors. Each year I provided a high-level plan that the Directors built on and formulated prioritized work plans and budgets for each year. We have built on the fundamental foundations of Bayshore and have successfully implemented many improvements to the management and administration of Bayshore while significantly upgrading many of the great assets we enjoy in the community.

With limited resources and a volunteer Board, we focused many of the activities on the Membership Research twice completed in the Village. This research ensured that the Board focused on the things the membership desired. It provided us with the ever-changing demographic of the membership and will be commissioned again during the coming year. I would like to thank Jon Wagner for his efforts in helping develop, execute, and analyze the research feedback. If commissioned externally, it would easily have cost us \$40K per event. It really set the foundation for all the work completed over the years.

#### Positive Highlights

Below is the work completed by the Board during my tenure. It is by no means a comprehensive list of all the activities, but rather highlights the positive changes that have occurred in the last few years:

- Successful implementation of a cost-effective, ongoing Goose Management Program. Neighbouring communities are overrun with geese, while we have few impacting our facilities.
- Upgrading and rewriting the BVA Bylaws and regulations to eliminate duplication and provide clarity. Removal of the initiation fee. Today we have more members in good standing than ever, including members joining by paying the back fees of nonmember homes. Members new and old continue to show a strong commitment to our Bylaws.
- Successfully defended Bayshore from a \$68K water bill, reducing it to \$12K.
- Successful defence of various litigations against Bayshore.
- Electoral reform allowed members to run for a specific Director position ensuring we matched individual capabilities with specific job functions.

- Contracting a new service provider to upgrade our website and email communications. With volunteer creativity, improvements occurred each year to these critical communication apertures.
- Implementing lifeguards and pool equipment upgrades, shower, umbrellas, gas heaters and repairing solar heating to reduce expenses.
- Completed a total rebuild of Harbour 33 with floating docks and shore walls.
- Expansion of Harbour 99 both fixed and floating docks with room to further expand the harbour, should it be required in the future.
- Repair and partial rebuild of Harbour 66 providing flexibility for the future.
- Successful implementation of an Arbour Plan and the Ash Borer Program.
- Market-based laddered GIC's to maximize our reserve investments.
- Jeff Zammit has re-engineered the administration, budget and accounting for Bayshore while successfully managing our finances which has made the capital programs and rebuilding possible. He successfully migrated our business to a new and more cost-effective accountant. He has also overseen the office administration by Lee Leivo.
- Introduction and implementation of a long-range plan within the budget process to ensure future Boards are committed to a longer-range view of the budget and facility management while protecting our capital reserves.
- We installed new drainage and grading within the golf course and new irrigation pumps and sprinkler systems.
- Successfully implemented contractor maintenance of the golf course to support our volunteers in managing the upkeep of the course.
- Completed a total rebuild of the tennis courts with the inclusion of four pickleball courts.
- We successfully remodelled the Hayloft. We eliminated all the infrastructure problems, upgraded the plumbing and electrical, while really improving the image the Hayloft presents about Bayshore. We rebuilt the washrooms, showers and saunas and upgraded mechanical units. Installed new flooring levelled between all the main floor rooms. Installed a new sprinkler system at the Hayloft gardens and a new security camera system. By completing the renovation during COVID, we saved several thousand dollars in material and labour costs. The Hayloft is home to many clubs, programs, and social events. It is the front facing asset of the community.
- Over the last few years, the research drove the internet issues and more recently myself, Doug Davies, Jeff Zammit and Joey Torchia successfully implemented the Bell Fibe 5G Internet and TV Service replacing all the other service providers. This was a step change for these services that many never believed we would be able to implement in the Village. There were many points within the negotiations

with Bell that this deal could have fallen apart. Only the persistence and creativity of these Directors made this program possible. We used the research to gauge acceptance and develop the communications plans. Past internet team members were engaged as a sales force to promote the program. We met all our objectives through the successful implementation of this program at an unbelievable low cost to the members. We are finishing the first of three years and have another two-year option at the negotiated rates, all during the most restrictive isolation protocols of COVID. Doug's technical team brought many internet improvements to the Village, but Fibe for TV and internet was the final solution which will serve the community for years to come.

- A good number of these projects and programs were managed during COVID, which provided many challenges to the Board and really added significant personal pressure to my position as President.
- One good by-product of COVID was the development of a new AGM and GM process which has met its objective of maximizing participation of the membership in the decision-making and voting processes. We will continue to enhance this medium moving forward.

#### **Managing Change**

During my tenure, not one major motion placed before the membership has been defeated. I believe that shows a strong commitment by the membership to the Board and how it has managed the affairs of Bayshore.

Managing change through productivity, administration and asset improvements require significantly more effort than sustaining ongoing plans and programs. Having completed the aggressive plans above, I believe the Directors' roles in the future will be much less complex and less time consuming for any volunteers. The heavy lifting has been completed. Our assets are in great shape. The business foundations have been memorialized and have become the new normal to support management of Bayshore moving forward.

#### Thank you

A leader is only as good as his team. I recruited Directors over the years, while others came forward to serve. I have had the pleasure of dealing with the following Directors throughout my tenure:

- **Doug Davies** as Hayloft Director, VP and Ex-officio. Doug has been a personal confidente during the trying times in Bayshore, especially the initial years of my Presidency. I appreciate his counsel over the years and especially through the Bell negotiations.
- **Jeff Zamitt**, Director of Finance, has provided simply outstanding service to the community. His financial and business acumen has been invaluable to me as the

President. The list of re-engineering is too long to list here. Jeff has had a major impact on Bayshore through all he has accomplished. Our most recent budget was our most difficult to compile given inflationary pressures and COVID supply chains issues. Jeff was up to the challenge.

- Joey Torchia, our Corporate Secretary, has provided vast improvement to our daily and weekly communication process. He provided new tools to manage Bylaw compliance and goose management. He and Jeff helped develop the new GM and AGM processes. Joey has successfully recruited members for the Banner and overseen the website and its development. He was actively involved in the tennis court rebuild and our pool upgrades.
- Steve Goulter and his volunteers have effectively implemented the Ash Borer and Arbour Programs and successfully negotiated and renewed all the Common Lands contracts for grass cutting, snow removal and our new golf course maintenance contract. Remember your third Ash Borer treatment will be free.
- I would like to recognize **Astrid Bruce** and her committee members for her VP work associated with rewriting the Bylaws.
- Kate White, our newest Vice President, will be managing our Bylaw compliance and real estate luncheons moving forward. Bylaw compliance to Bayshore's standards will be on the agenda for the AGM so all members are aware of the Board's approach in a post-COVID environment.
- **Keith Meadows** has effectively managed the Goose Management contract for years. As Common Waters Director he has successfully implemented improvements in pond equipment and its maintenance. He has managed the annual spraying for weeds in the ponds and marinas. During the last five years he was also the Harbour Master at 66.
- **Deb Rautins** managed social programs during a pandemic. I think that is an oxymoron. Her creativity kept people in the Village engaged during all the everchanging COVID protocols. Offsite events, Canada Day celebrations etc., could have easily been cancelled, but Deb and her committee soldiered on to provide some much-needed interaction in the Village for everyone's mental and physical wellbeing.
- **Kevin Fox** for all his work on the Hayloft renovations. His firm was the lowest and most comprehensive bid. Having said that, there were many items beyond the scope of work for the project that were completed free of charge by Kevin's firm.
- **Kevin Fox** along with **Bill Pike** were responsible for rebuilding and revitalizing the marinas at a critical time as COVID pushed slip demand to all time high levels.
- · Ted Spain for his initial repairs of the tennis court.
- Rod Turnbull for his work on the Hayloft, pool and tennis courts.

- **Jeff Nolan** for single-handedly managing the Director of Architecture position during a very busy time. Jeff will be harmonizing the Ramara and Bayshore Bylaws in the near future to ensure future additions and new dwellings maintain the very essence of the Village.
- At the centre of all this activity is our office manager, **Lee Leivo**, who has done an excellent job juggling all the Directors' priorities and administration of the day-to-day affairs of the Village.
- Her predecessor **Tara Gibson** was also an important part of all our accomplishments.

Together we have run the Village. If we were to annualize the past salaries of all these Directors, the members would have received ~\$1.5+M / year of managerial, professional, and technical services for free. They are clearly a talented and dedicated team that made all the changes listed above possible. It was a pleasure to work with them.

By extension to the Board, I would like to thank the many volunteers and committee members whose dedication to Bayshore made the improvements possible and Bayshore the unique community that it is.

#### Bayshore Leaves a Lasting Impression

I would like to share one short story that emphasizes to me what Bayshore represents. Two years ago at a Canada Day celebration, restricted to a parade only due to COVID, I went to the Hayloft where I met the security team for Jill Dunlop. The black suits, Ray-Ban sunglasses, and the black SUV made them easy to identify. Jeff Nolan insisted they soften their appearance by placing several Canada flags on the vehicle for the parade, which they did. This was the only event Jill was attending because of COVID so she left by herself to go home.

After the parade, the security detail took the time to come to my house to provide the following feedback. The detail indicated that they travel all over the province with the Premier and other Cabinet Ministers. "We just can't believe what a great place this is. The marinas, the golf course the tennis courts, the community centre." They indicated that they had "never seen such a community in all their travels." They could not believe the property and facility standards, the upkeep of all the houses, the openness, and the private and public gardens.

When I told them our annual membership fee structure and the volunteer work ethic, they were blown away. Hardened and trained security personnel just had to take the time to tell me about their first and lasting impressions of a great community. It made me proud to be President, leading a great team for a great community. Let's keep it that way!





#### The Rhythms of Light and Darkness

We, in Bayshore, enjoy many activities in the summer months! When August comes, we realize that the sun is setting earlier each night and sunrise comes later in the morning. Essentially, we are experiencing fewer daylight hours as we advance into autumn. The birds instinctively know their time to migrate southward, as do some of us, when we start planning where to spend our time in warmer climates.

In the springtime we observe the opposite effect to what is occurring now, with daylight hours increasing significantly! Flowers peek their heads out of the snow and birds return to start their nesting rituals in response to these changes.

Have you ever wondered why our planet has this variation of daylight and temperature? The Earth revolves around the sun every 365.25 days. However, while we are moving around the sun, our planet also rotates like a spinning top every 24 hours. The spin axis is tilted at 23.5 degrees to the plane of the orbit around the sun. On September 21st the sun was directly overhead on the equator. This is called the autumnal equinox. The sun will appear to move in a more southerly direction until it reaches the Tropic of Capricorn at a latitude of 23.4 degrees south of the equator on December 21st. We call this the Winter solstice for the Northern Hemisphere. At this time, the Southern Hemisphere is angled towards the sun and the Northern Hemisphere is angled away from the sun.

When this occurs, where is Bayshore? Well, on December 21st, we experience the fewest daylight hours, while the Southern Hemisphere experiences the most daylight hours. This is because the South Pole is tilted towards the sun and the North Pole is in shadow facing away from the sun. Any land in the world north of the Arctic Circle (also a line of latitude) will be in some degree of darkness.

The sun will start to move northwards slowly until March 21st (the vernal equinox) when the sun will again be directly overhead at the equator. September 21st and March 21st mark the beginning of our autumn and our spring. In the Southern Hemisphere it is the opposite: They have spring when we enter autumn and they have autumn when we enter spring. The two dates are called the equinoxes because our planet has the same amount of daylight hours in both the Northern and the Southern Hemispheres on only those dates. At the summer solstice on June 21st, the sun is overhead at the Tropic of Cancer, and the Northern Hemisphere experiences the longest day of the year. When we have summer after June 21st, the Southern Hemisphere will have winter!

People living above the Arctic Circle will have varying lengths of polar darkness after December 21st, depending on their latitude. The average duration is around 30 days, but more northerly locations can experience almost two months of darkness. At the poles, darkness would last about 11 weeks! On December 21st when we have the fewest hours of daylight, the Arctic has even fewer. At the winter solstice, Ontario experiences sunset at 4:48 pm. The day is 6 hours and 31 minutes shorter than our longest day, June 21st.

The Inuit have a special celebration for their spring (March Equinox), for the date marks the beginning of the return of the sun to their land. The sun will rise briefly and then set below the horizon again. Each day from then on, they will see the sun rise for a longer period of time. It is a very special event for them after so long in darkness and they spend ten days celebrating! Can you blame them?

I do hope this has helped some of you understand why we have seasons and the varying hours of daylight over the year. It is a difficult concept to understand, and I have tried my best to explain it to you.

#### Recipes

#### **CURRIED LENTIL SALAD – Diane Stoner**

1-1/2 cups green lentils, rinsed\*

1/2 cup currants

1 sweet red pepper, diced

2 green onions, chopped

Dressing:

1/4 cup vegetable oil

1/4 cup red wine vinegar

1 Tbsp lemon juice

1 tsp curry powder

1 tsp Dijon mustard

1/2 tsp ground cumin

1/2 tsp each cinnamon, salt and pepper

Pinch ground cloves



- 1. For dressing: Whisk together oil, vinegar, lemon juice and spices. Set aside.
- 2. Rinse lentils in cold water and drain.
- 3. In saucepan, bring lentils and 3 cups of water to boil; reduce heat, cover and simmer for 20-25 minutes or until tender. Drain and let cool.\*
- 4. In bowl, toss together lentils, currants, red pepper, onions and dressing

\* I use one can brown lentils, drain well. To remove the skins, place beans in a bowl of water and skim off the skins as they float to the top. This step is optional. OR use cooked green lentils: cook dry lentils as instructed for 20 minutes. I rinsed the lentils again after cooking by placing them in a bowl and covering with cold water. The skins will float to the top. Will have to do this several times. I used all the dressing as it makes more than canned lentils.

Makes 4 servings and tastes better when made ahead of time, at least the day before.

#### MAPLE GLAZED STUFFED PORK TENDERLOIN - Diane Stoner

2 pork tenderloins

2 apples peeled and finely chopped

1/2 cup finely chopped apricots, dried apple, pear or fig

1/2 cup dried craisins or raisins

1/4 cup finely chopped celery

1/4 cup chopped pecans

1/2 cup finely chopped onion

3/4 cup apple juice or cider (I used a bit of orange juice)

1/4 cup maple syrup divided

1/2 tsp salt

1/4 tsp pepper

10-12 slices of bacon (enough to cover the entire tenderloin)



- 1. Preheat oven to 350F.
- 2. Working with one tenderloin at a time, place on cutting board and slice lengthwise almost all the way through. Spread it open and hammer to a thickness of 3/8". Do the same to the other tenderloin.
- 3. In a medium bowl, mix the apple, apricots, craisins, celery, pecans, onion, apple juice and half the maple syrup and salt and pepper.
- 4. Fill the tenderloins with the filling and wrap bacon around the meat. Place both tenderloins in a glass baking dish and drizzle with remaining maple syrup.
- 5. If there is any filling left over, just pack it around the meat and bake it at the same time.
- 6. Bake uncovered for 45 minutes or until the internal temperature of the pork is 140F.
- 7. Remove from oven and cover with foil. Let the meat rest 5-10 minutes before slicing. Enjoy!

#### Dressing:


1/3 cup olive oil (regular is preferred)



#### **Anglers' Corner**

#### **Lake Trout Fishing**

Lake trout seek out oxygenrich water. They find this up to the 20 foot depth in spring. They retreat to deep water 100 to 120 feet depth over the summer. In the winter they can be at any depth. Summer fishing for us is trolling 100 to 125 foot depth. We use downriggers to get the bait down to those depths. We use a gang troll, which is a series of three blades about the size of your hand. The vibration

and flash attract trout from a great distance. We attach a spoon, body bait or spinner about three feet behind the flashers.

Our biggest fish to date is 24 pounds. We find herring, perch, minnows and zebra mussels in the belly when we clean them. Many people find the taste of trout too strong. Others enjoy them fried, baked, smoked or canned.

It's a relaxing day on the lake, enjoying the warm weather and scenery. The excitement starts when the rod pops up. It's fish on and the battle begins. And it is a battle.

I want to thank Catherine and Bob for submitting such an informative article about their excursions on Lake Simcoe fishing for the elusive Lake Trout.

In my view, they are the experts when it comes to fishing Lakers. They make numerous trips out onto the water during the Lake Trout season, which closes in a few weeks to allow spawning which occurs each fall.

Now we turn our attention to the "fall fishing" season and the numerous species of fish who put on the feed bag to fatten up for the long winter, cold and hard water season. The pike, bass, walleye and muskie are on the hunt in shallow water to feed on the smaller game fish who in turn are chasing bait fish such as shiners, dace and other minnow species.


Big lures for big fish is the name of the game this time of year. The use of everything "flashy," such as Mepps spinners with big bucktail horse hair or feathers attached to the hooks is very effective also. Many varieties of spinners work well too. Some prefer live bait such as a six to eight inch sucker minnow attached to a hook and bobber or float. Those big "gators" cannot resist this application.

#### White Squirrels

For new residents to Bayshore and the many visitors who come to our village, many are surprised to see a few white squirrels that frequent our yards and parks in the area. White squirrels are almost always a version of the eastern grey squirrel. While some of these squirrels are albino (having pink eyes), many are not. The others are called white morphs. This is a different genetic aberration that is very rare. The result is called Leucism, which is a condition in which there is a partial loss of pigmentation resulting in white, pale or patchy colouration of the fur or hair but not the eyes. There are several ways scientists think that white morphs appear. Sometimes squirrels are born with genes that produce minimal amounts of melanin. A squirrel's hair colour is dependent on the amount of melanin in the hair cells. Too much melanin creates black, too little creates white, and moderate levels create blonde. However, some squirrels have mixed amounts of melanin in their hair cells located on different parts of their bodies. These are called piebald variations of white morphs. We have several squirrels that have white chests or paws, sometimes with white tufts on their ears etc. These are very beautiful but uncommon as well.

Small populations of white squirrels are found all over North America and we have a healthy population of grey, black and some piebald squirrels right here in Bayshore. Our white squirrels have been reduced in the past few years for whatever reason, possibly predation but that is the way of nature.

It is an interesting phenomenon, and we are privileged to enjoy the company of these squirrels in Bayshore.

In Exeter Ontario, white squirrels have become the town's mascots. The population appears to be abundant. The town decorates their garbage cans, lampposts, and some retail stores on the main street with white squirrel motifs. This has even become a tourist draw for visitors to the area. The town of about 4,500 is located 40 km northwest of London Ontario and their mascot, Willis the White Wonder, is often seen on many occasions such as the Canada Day parade and the Santa Claus parade.

There are some who believe that the population of white squirrels is increasing. In the United States, some towns have trapped black and grey squirrels to promote more white ones. Albino squirrels are very rare, due, possibly to their poor eyesight, as their eyes have no pigmentation to protect them from the sun's rays. This in turn makes them prone to being caught as prey or prone to falls from trees. While the white variation should make these squirrels more at risk from predators it doesn't seem to be a huge factor. However, I have observed one being carried away in the mouth of a red fox in the early morning hours of a summer day in 2016. The other squirrels seem to accept them as their own and squirrels of many colours can be seen under bird feeders competing for the seed that has fallen. It is humorous to watch them chase each other away from the food only to have another slip in behind and eat to its heart's content!

Yes, we in Bayshore are fortunate to enjoy the wildlife around us in such a beautiful setting. It is a pleasure to watch the white squirrels in their daily tasks, along with the other animals that we share this rural environment in all seasons of the year.

Keep your eyes on the lookout! There could be a white squirrel out in your yard right now. And if your timing is right, you just might get a picture to prove that you really saw one!







Looking for activities to do with the kids and grandkids? Here are a few ideas to keep them busy. Please contribute your ideas for our next issue!




Well, we sure had some fun one rainv day making this castle. All it took was some wrapping paper, boxes, some paper towel rolls, glue, tape, a marker or two. scissors and a little imagination.

After making the castle, the g'kids amused themselves for a good while by using some toy people and making up stories and recreating fairy tales. With only a small bit of help from me with the scissors, they spent almost an entire afternoon creating this by themselves.


Now, I know the point of this page is to share screen-free ideas for the kiddies, but, I have a couple of apps on my phone that I want to share with you. Anyone of any age can enjoy these and you just might get your kids or g'kids interested in astronomy, recognizing constellations, or just

plain stargazing for fun.



If you touch a planet, you will see the name of that planet at the bottom too. Click on the name of anything for more information. I like this app because you can see some satellites. Here's what it looked like when I touched the image of the International Space Station. See orbital path? And the Hubble Telescope happens to be below it. Amazing.

Here is an example of the app, Skyview Lite. You simply download and open the app, and move your phone or tablet around. You can see what's above and below the horizon (the red line). You can also see the orbit trail of planets and stars just by moving your device around. If you touch part of the screen, the stars will join like connect-the-dots and form a constellation - see the name at the bottom?



The other app I like is called Star Tracker. This one has a little more detail and has a busier screen. You can see shooting stars and nebulas, as well as constellations and planets. Also, as you can see, the names of everything are tagged without you having to tap or touch the screen.



Here's an example the Star Tracker screen basically pointed in the same direction the as Skyview Lite example. You'll notice it has a lot more going on which sometimes I like and sometimes I don't, so I switch between both apps.

You can turn on and off some features like the music, 3D visuals and other things shown in the menu at the left Just play with it and it's easy to navigate. There is an ad at the top which is a bit annoying but unless you want to pay for this app, you're stuck with the ad. We are blessed to have little

if any light pollution here at Bayshore. Often on a clear night I'll be outside looking up and wondering, "What am I looking at?" So I'll get out my phone and launch one or both apps. I've had these loaded on my phone for years and use them often. If the g'kids are here, sometimes I take them outside with me to play around with these, but interestingly enough, both of these apps also work from inside the house.

Inside or outside, these work best if you turn your Location setting on.

One last bonus feature about these apps is that they are both free! There are paid versions available if you really get into it, but for me, free is just fine.




