



Another season reaches its finale: where did that go?!!

It seems our ice fishing season is getting shorter and shorter, as the lake takes its sweet time to freeze up to where it's safe enough to venture out.

Some interesting views when the lake flash freezes: Barnstable Bay has mostly a flat layer of ice on the surface, but as you go further out

towards the 14-foot honey hole, the surface layer changes dramatically.

This year, for example, open water froze quickly causing a layering effect of ice, and an overnight snowstorm, along with high winds, churned the water into forming snowballs, which in turn froze into place. It was quite interesting to see this phenomenon as it was easy to see through the clear ice.

But we make the most of it, with some fine catches of jumbo perch, whitefish, lake trout, pike, and burbot.

Again this year, like last, we had to deal with slush under the ice, which makes clearing the drilled hole a bit more work than many of us would like. Once cleared though, the fun begins.

It is so great to have such an amazing fishery so close to our front doors. In minutes we can be in very productive waters for so many species.

You just never know what to expect when enjoying a moment over a hole looking down into 14 feet of clear water. Many fish species travel through the viewpoint and, yes, there are some unexpected surprises, especially when a large bowfin or burbot sticks its head up through your hole to expel a burp of air, take a breath, and then slip back down into the depths below. I still don't think lan will forget that experience, lol.

Well, that wraps up another season of hard water fishing. We now look forward to the summer and many great days of fishing the open water.

Remember, before the boats are delivered to the harbours, there is an opening to fish the harbours up until May 15th. Jumbo perch, crappie, and northern pike can be found in the harbours. Please leave the largemouth bass alone in the harbours at this time as the females are sitting on nests, protecting their eggs and hatchlings. Removing a female from the nest allows other egg-eating species such as sunfish and gobies to feed on the unprotected eggs or babies.

I look forward to seeing you all out on the water and sharing stories and pictures of your fishing adventures. Stay safe and have a terrific summer.

A Life Lesson From Cake

Have you ever wanted to bake something for a special occasion while trying a new idea? It can be scary sometimes as I am not a baker. I hesitantly share some creations while I will "tolerate'" my other creations alone. But there is always that nagging doubt – what will it taste like? Will it go over well with my guests?

I did just this recently for a friend's birthday. I wanted to make a special cake and I had an idea of marinating fresh pineapple in coconut milk, using that as the theme for my cake. When googling what type of cake to make with the concoction, I came up empty. Either it was coconut OR pineapple cake recipes, or it was a recipe using both but NOT what I had in mind (tons of whipped cream and a graham cracker crust). If you are looking for coconutmarinated pineapple chicken recipes, you've got it made, but I was stumped for a cake recipe to go with this.

When in doubt, gravitate to what you know!!! I resorted to a recipe I had for an upside-down pineapple cake, adding shredded coconut. Rather than making the topping as directed, I used the altered topping IN the cake batter and the balance as a layer filler & topping. I sliced the cake into 16 small wedges as the cake is quite moist (understatement) and rather rich, but you know your crowd – slice as desired.

The moment of truth! Before serving, I had warned the recipients that it was a new recipe for me and if they didn't like it, they were to do the same as they do when I show them some of my craft ideas - smile, nod, and walk away!! I anxiously tried the first forkful and started my personal judgement. As this was a new combination for me, I wasn't sure what to expect – the upside-down cake had a different consistency. Was it good? Was I judging myself too harshly? I watched with a poker face the reaction of those eating it. No one made a strange face - that's a good start! When they commented (unprovoked) on the cake, my self-doubt kicked in one last time. Were they just being nice? Or was it actually good? I laid my fears aside when one of the comments came a few days later that they had liked the cake and wanted the recipe!!! No one, as far as I knew, had ever requested the recipe for food they DIDN'T like!

Because the recipe was a spin of another, I had to write it all out for the requestor, so I thought I would share it with you while I was at it. If you are not interested in the cake, at least take away the lesson – sometimes in life, it needs reinforcing. Take the risk, and try something new – whether a recipe, an activity or a new hobby. If it fails, you can learn more lessons and try again, or move on to something else, knowing that it wasn't for you. If it succeeds, you are rewarded in so many ways. Just take chances in life! Most times you may not regret it. And if you fail, your friends will always forgive you. It may take a while for the jokes to die down, but that's the fun between friends.

I didn't think to take a picture, but here is one that looks similar, although single-layered (cherry optional).

JOHANNE'S COCONUT PINEAPPLE CAKE

- 1 can coconut milk
- 1 fresh pineapple, peeled, cored, diced
- 1 cup shredded coconut (toasted)
- 1 1/3 cup flour
- 2/3 cup granulated sugar
- 2 tsp baking powder
- 1/4 cup margarine, softened
- 1 egg
- 1 Tbsp margarine softened 1/3 cup brown sugar



Empty contents of canned coconut milk into a large bowl, whisking until smooth.

Stir in diced pineapple, cover, and let sit in the fridge for at least 4 hours (I left mine overnight). Once the pineapple has sufficiently been marinated in the coconut milk, you can begin making the cake.

Preheat oven to 350°F. In an oven-safe dish, pour in the shredded coconut and toast for about 15 minutes, stirring occasionally to evenly toast. (Be careful – it goes from toasted to burned guickly!)

Sift together the flour, granulated sugar, and baking powder in a bowl. Set aside.

Remove the coconut-pineapple mixture from the fridge and stir in the toasted coconut. Pour half the mixture into a separate bowl, along with 1/4 cup softened margarine and egg. Once thoroughly incorporated, add the flour mixture and combine well. Pour the cake mixture into greased cake pans (I separated into two 9-inch pans for thin layered cakes).

Bake for approximately 45 minutes at 350°F, watching to make sure edges do not brown too quickly.

While the cake is baking, you can make the topping. In a saucepan on medium heat, melt 1 Tbsp margarine. Add brown sugar and stir until the sugar is fully dissolved and starting to caramelize. Stir in the remaining coconut and pineapple mixture. Allow to simmer, stirring occasionally. When the liquid has had a chance to reduce, remove from heat and set aside to cool (not in the fridge – coconut milk may reharden).

When cakes have finished baking, remove them from the pan and allow them to cool (as they are thin layers – they may crumble easily if not transferred to a cooling rack carefully).

Once the cake layers have cooled, place one layer on a serving plate and cover the surface with half the melted coconut mixture. Place the second cake layer on top and cover with the remaining coconut mixture. Cover and refrigerate for at least an hour. Enjoy!!!

RHUBARB BREAD - Heather Horbay

Bread:

Glaze

1 cup sugar

1/2 cup powdered sugar

1 tsp orange or lemon zest

2 to 3 Tbsp orange or lemon juice

2 tsp vanilla

1/2 cup vegetable oil

3/4 cup milk

2 eggs

2 cups flour

1/2 tsp salt

1 1/2 tsp baking powder

2 cups fresh rhubarb, diced



- Preheat oven to 350°F.
- In a large mixing bowl, combine sugar, orange/lemon zest, vanilla, vegetable oil, milk and eggs. Whisk to combine
 well.
- In a separate bowl, blend flour, salt and baking powder.
- · Rinse the rhubarb and pat dry.
- Gently fold the flour mixture into the wet ingredients. Stir just until wet and dry ingredients are combined. Lumps and streaks of flour in the batter are fine. Mix rhubarb into the batter. Do not overmix.
- Pour batter into greased or parchment lined 9x5 inch loaf pan.
- Bake for 55 to 60 minutes or until toothpick tester comes out clean.
- Cool in pan for 20 minutes before removing from pan.
- Whisk together the ingredients for the glaze.
- Drizzle the glaze over the bread.

BLUEBERRY BAKED OATMEAL - Paul Stoner

2 cups of gluten-free or regular rolled oats 3/4 cups of milk

1 cup of applesauce or 3 mashed bananas

1/4 cup chopped walnuts

2 eggs

1/4 cup brown sugar

2 tsp vanilla

1 1/2 tsp cinnamon

1/2 tsp baking powder

1/4 tsp salt

2 cups blueberries, fresh or frozen



- Mix all ingredients together except for the blueberries.
- Grease 9" x 9" pan or line pan with parchment paper.
- Spread 1/2 oatmeal mixture into pan. Sprinkle 3/4 of blueberries on top of this mixture. Top with the rest of the oatmeal mixture and sprinkle remaining blueberries on top.
- Refrigerate overnight.
- Bake at 350°F for 30 35 minutes or until baked through.
- Serve warm with a dollop of yogurt on top.







The Governor's Rapture by Paul Butler (2023, Engen Books, Chapel Arm, NL)


The Governor's Rapture is a fictional historical novel that begins in St. John's NL in 1777. It's the story of Jessica George, a beautiful young woman of mixed race who falls in love with a young British sailor, Matthew, in the days before he is scheduled to sail away from the port. Tragically, Jessica learns that

Matthew has been killed in a duel the night before his departure; soon afterwards, she finds that she is pregnant as the result of their tryst, making her a destitute single mother and an object of scorn.


The story takes a few astounding twists and turns, and comes to a conclusion forty years later in the contact between Jessica's granddaughter, Eliza George, and the


Governor of Newfoundland. It's a great read; any further revelations would wreck the surprises that take place in the tale.

Paul Butler, the author, was born in England, lived in Newfoundland for many years, and now lives with his wife in Lethbridge AB. His writing is rich and perceptive and always very readable. I'd also recommend the book he's holding in the photo: The Good Doctor challenges the



fame of Dr. Wilfred Grenfell, a Newfoundland hero. You could find other titles by googling "Paul Butler Novelist."





A New Season by Terry **Fallis** (2023, **McClelland** Stewart/Penguin Random House)

It's a strange surprise: a well-known humorist writes a tender love story about a 62-year-old ball hockey player.

A New Season is a story about a man who has been playing ball hockey for many summers in a league that plays on an outdoor rink in Toronto. Jack

McMaster, a freelance copywriter, suffers the tragic loss of his beloved wife to the COVID pandemic, and feels that the good part of his life is over, at too young an age. His ball hockey buddies take a strong role in the narrative. In search of some kind of renewal, Jack moves to Paris for a few months to connect with his interest in the 1920's Left Bank world of Hemingway and Morley Callaghan. (If you look closely, you can see the Eiffel Tower in the illustration on the cover of the book.) In the process, Jack tries out his high school French on a middle-aged worker in his favourite coffee shop, and eventually begins a friendship with her. There are several developments before Jack resumes his ball hockey career in the new season that's referred to in the title.

Terry Fallis has twice won the Stephen Leacock Memorial Medal for Humour (awarded in Orillia, of course), most notably for The Best-Laid Plans. about a political strategist who tries to ensure his retirement by working for a hopeless candidate, only to find that the curmudgeon becomes popular and gets elected to parliament. Besides being a humorist, Fallis is graduate of McMaster



University in Mechanical and Biomedical Engineering. To find him writing a love story is a pleasant surprise.






