Hi Bayshore. Summer is here in full swing. Thanks to all who helped open the pool this year and got the gardens around the clubhouse looking so great. These are really the unsung heroes who work in the background doing all those things that we take for granted. Cleaning the pool furniture, emptying the blue box by the kiosk and others too many to list.

The pool is fully functional this year with salt finally in enough supply and the propane and solar heater working. Our go forward plans with the pool were approved at this year's general meeting. Thanks again for all that support. We are currently trying to award the work for the chemical control system but we are now in the peak season for pool work and so many contractors have had orders for over a year.

Our first volunteer pool tester meeting was held and we have a skeletal group right now trying to cover two full days of testing and five additional nights. A reminder that closing or opening the pool will earn the "Volunteer" \$15

and the full day \$30. Please let us know through the office if you can spare some time. No charge for training, haha! The AED (Automated External Defibrillator) originally located at the top of the stairs in the Hayloft, should be moved by the time you read this, outside near the mail kiosk. Training was scheduled for June 25. This new location will hopefully serve us better as it is closer to a higher traffic area and you will not need to enter the clubhouse to get one. The main hallway unit will stay in place, inside.

I was made aware of serious trouble with the kitchen stoves upstairs. Seems one of the local, well respected caterers could not heat or reheat the main courses in a timely fashion, or should I say not at all. We will certainly be looking into rectifying the issue as soon as possible. I like buying pizza at Lanterna and right now the chef has a target on my back.



#### **Director of Common Waters Report**



Earlier in the spring we continued with our ongoing effort to maintain pond-related equipment by servicing four more of the aerators (fountains). We also added a plastic covering over all of the wires powering the aerators to stop/reduce the number of times the wire is chewed by muskrats and beavers.

The Pond Masters and Assistants have begun adding dyes and

enzymes to the ponds. These are added monthly to help reduce the weed and algae growth. We have been doing this for a number of years and they pose no danger to gardens or pets through irrigation. However, the herbicide spraying will commence sometime around the middle of July. A notice will go out before spraying letting people know which ponds will be sprayed this year and reminding those people not to irrigate their lawns for a few days immediately after. Important: please do not throw grass clippings/weeds into ponds — it increases nitrogen levels and promotes weed growth.

Some residents have talked about stocking the ponds with fish, but please be aware that in Ontario it is illegal to transport live fish, other than baitfish, taken from Ontario waters or to transfer or stock any live fish or spawn into Ontario's waters without a special license to transport or stock fish. Sport fish transported over land must be dead and should be transported on ice, not in a live well filled with water. PLEASE do not add any fish to the ponds! The ponds were designed as a catch basin for water runoff. While certain species of fish may help alleviate one problem, they almost always create a new problem.

A reminder to everyone that they need to stay vigilant about chasing geese off their property. The best way to avoid having to chase geese is to put up barriers to keep them off your property, especially at this time of year when they are molting and can't fly. Put up temporary fences (ideally something the geese can't see through or over) but even tying fishing line onto stakes and attaching strips of material to the line can be effective. Alternatively, plant shrubs for a more permanent solution. Shrubs such as dogwood work well, or letting the shoreline vegetation grow tall and thick (again, this is only effective if there are no breaks and the geese can't see through it or over it). The BVA invests a significant amount of money in the Goose Management Program each year so your co-operation is greatly appreciated.

Remember, geese are protected under the Migratory Bird Convention Act and it is illegal to scare, harass or do anything to move a nesting goose unless you have a permit. It is illegal to destroy a nest or eggs without a permit, even on your own property. However, as an individual, you are allowed to use passive means to herd geese off your property (as long as you don't move them into a dangerous situation). Members from the Wildlife Management Group are here in Bayshore multiple times a week (sometimes twice a day) scaring the geese away. They change the times they are here from morning to evening so the geese don't get used to seeing

them at one particular time of day. They are limited to how aggressive they can be at certain times of the year, especially when the geese are molting and there are goslings around. Under the previous agreement with Wildlife Management, there was no obligation for them to provide us with any data. Under the new contract, which started June 1st, they have begun providing us with data. However, even though they were under no obligation to do so, they started giving us information in May as a trial month..

Here is what we have for the month of May:

- May 5 to 31
- Number of Visits 18 (average of 4.5 visits per week)
- Number of hours on site: 12 hours 30 minutes
- Average number of geese found and scared\*: 42
- Nests and/or eggs found in May: 0
- Controls used: lasers, dogs, predator noises
- \* # of geese found/scared off common lands and waters. The service provider cannot scare geese off residential/private property. That is up to you, the homeowner.

Fences have been installed by Ramara at two of the township parks including Sandcastle Park and Sand Piper Park. A silt fence has also been installed at Park Lane Park which is owned by Bayshore Village. Remember that these fences are to help keep the geese out of the village during the molting period which generally lasts for about four to five weeks. After the molt is over, the fences will be removed.

Please don't forget to use the Goose Reporting Tool on the Bayshore website. By filling out the form, you help identify problem areas to the Wildlife Management Group. However, please do not submit multiple reports for the same birds on the same day.

Avian Flu: last year we modified the form to allow for the reporting of sick or dead birds. This is another reason to keep geese off your property as there have been reports of dogs getting sick after eating feces from infected birds.

Do not feed the geese or swans! Ramara recently passed a bylaw (2022.95) which states that "No person shall throw or place, or permit to be thrown or placed any type of feed in a yard for the purposes of feeding birds or wildlife." It goes on to say that homeowners have a responsibility to maintain the ground underneath a bird feeder by regularly cleaning up spilled bird feed. If you know of someone who likes to feed the swans, geese or ducks, they may not be aware this regulation. Please let them know.

And finally, we are still looking for two chemical sprayers (people who oversee the spraying of the herbicide in the ponds and harbours). These people will be provided online training that will allow us to have two licensed individuals again. If no one steps forward to take this course, we will have to hire an outside company to provide this service for us. This could be quite costly. Many thanks to everyone for their ongoing efforts.

#### Regular and Bid Euchre Janet Sauve - Organizer




toss until coated. Season with 1/2 tsp salt and 1/4 tsp pepper.





#### **Bayshore Anglers Summer 2024**



It's summer and instead of repeating the usual message about fishing the wonderful waters that surround our amazing peninsula, I thought I'd go a different route with a challenge to all the anglers of Bayshore Village.

The challenge.....walleye!
The Ministry of Natural Resources
and Forests tells us the walleye

stocks in Lake Simcoe are less than in past years but still not sufficiently low to consider a stocking program. Hmmmmmmm, I say.

So, fellow anglers - I challenge you to target and find the walleye of Lake Simcoe.

Like some others, I have been told by the MNR, anglers, fishing guides, and fellow fishermen that Lake Simcoe walleye seem to be more like the Great Lakes strain than the Kawartha Lakes strain most anglers are used to. Meaning they stay deeper in the lake, following bait fish and migrate throughout the lake in search of food.

Kawartha walleye tend to hold on shallow shoals with adjacent weed lines with subtle to steep drop offs.

Migratory walleye, such as in Lake Erie, are mostly caught trolling, either by using downrigging equipment or flat lining with deep billed diving lures, such as the Rapala Tail Dancer series. Purple is my favourite.

Simcoe is a unique beast, being part of the Trent Severn Waterway. Walleye in Simcoe may have their own characteristics: a little bit Kawartha, a little bit deep basin Great Lakes.

During my time fishing walleye tournaments in the Kawarthas, various methods can be used successfully in bringing in a decent catch.

Night crawlers (dew worms) are always one of the top producers. A Mepps Black Fury with a worm is deadly, Power Grubs (white) on a jig head is killer good. Many love the crank bait or the Rapala minnow in various colors and patterns. Then of course there's Mother Nature's favourite, a live minnow presented in just about every way you can think of.

Electronics are a huge necessity in locating bait balls of swimming minnows. Information from sources tells us the walleye are below those schools of bait fish.

Now, armed with these fun facts, it's time to go out and find them, as I will be doing this summer.

I believe you have to target the Lake Simcoe walleye, as you would lake trout or smallmouth bass. They just don't seem to be caught by accident as in our neighbouring Kawartha Lakes.

If you choose to take the challenge, please share and record your success. Many in Bayshore would be very interested in knowing the Simcoe walleye are here and catchable.

Please also share your stories and pictures of other catches during the summer months. I, like many in Bayshore, would love to hear about your adventures.



#### **Volunteer News**



Bayshore folks, prepare to be amazed by the incredible number of volunteers and volunteer hours you have contributed to this last quarter! Spring is always our busiest season as we get ready for the warm and sunny weather. This year, I have managed to track most of the time spent by our dedicated and generous neighbours, and I am astounded by the results. We have had approximately 200 volunteers

(including repeat volunteers in various roles) contributing a total of 750 hours from April to June! And I am sure there are more hours uncounted, given the quiet, unrecognized efforts of many, including the countless hours of our Board of Directors. Here is a breakdown of some of the activities reported to me:

- Earth Day and General Clean-up Week: Maintenance and clean-up of all common lands.
- Goose Control: installing fencing, chasing and herding geese.
- Golf Course: Tree trimming, course clean-up and prep, greens cutting, miscellaneous work by the Course Superintendent, and Golf Committee meetings and responsibilities.
- Ponds: Adding dyes and enzymes and installing fountains and bubblers.
- Social Committee: Planning, setup, event management, and cleanup for events like Happy Hour for Snowbirds, St. Patrick's Day Potluck and Dance, Spring Fling, and Newcomers Luncheon and Club Fair.
- Pool: Repairing solar panels, removing the cover, and cleaning up around the pool, retiling the waterline, fixing cracked deck and flaking paint, and washing the waterline.



#### **Ramara Trails Committee Update**

Bayshore cyclists and hikers may find this Trails Committee information interesting. The Ramara Trails Committee has been working very hard over the fall and winter to further the network of trails throughout our township.

This committee could still use a couple more members so if cycling/hiking is one of your interests and you'd like to improve/increase trails, please contact the township to inquire.

The current trails are: Atherley Trail, Lagoon City Trail, Washago Trail, Bayshore Trail, and the South Ramara Trail. Information on these trails may be found on the Township website; however, I thought I would highlight some of the changes that have recently taken place.

Atherley Trail: The committee's main project for 2024 is the extension of this trail from the Casino to Airport Road. Since the old CN rail spur into Washago is no longer for sale, a future proposed project is enhancing the Longford Mills Trail/Rama Road, enabling one to cycle from Atherley to Washago. At Washago, close to the Rama Road/ 169 intersection the Washago Trail begins at Singing Pines and continues on a developed trail to Fair Grounds Road, then to Cronk Road, to Concession M/N, to Kings Side Road to Coopers Falls where it connects with the Muskoka Trail system.

Lagoon City Trail: You may have noticed some construction work at the end of the 15th Sideroad last fall. The township was working to make a trail that would eventually link to the Lagoon City Trail starting on Laguna Parkway. This trail is incomplete as there is still one section of the old rail bed that the township does not yet own. Wouldn't it be fun to bike from Bayshore to Lagoon City and eat at Lanterna, Pier One, or Fin City?

Bayshore Trail: A big change that Bayshore cyclists will be happy to hear is that the Township has purchased the formerly private property at Orkney Beach Road. Thus, the route into Orillia will revert to the old trail through Orkney and no longer necessitate crossing Highway 12 two times! The committee is also looking at the Township working on some unopened road allowances such as the 9th concession which could be an alternative to Muley Point Road. Although not paved, it would be much safer than Muley Point Road on busy summer days.

**South Ramara Trail:** This trail route is the same. However, last summer and fall construction began on County Road 47 with some 1st coat paving complete on the most southerly portion. Construction is underway again and is expected to be completed this summer with paved shoulders from the south end up to Concession A. The trail though, follows Lake Shore Drive south to Concession A, to Concession B to County Road 47 where it continues to Ramara's southern boundary and connects to the Brock Township Trails.

#### **PSA - Notice to Airmen**

Remote control model airplanes over Barnstable Bay During the warmer months from June to October, Bayshore RC Model club members may occasionally fly model RC planes in the Class G airspace over Barnstable Bay.

For those of you on the bay who may have visitors fly in on full size aircraft, please make them aware of this activity within the area shown on the picture. We fly at a maximum height of 300 feet and have a windsock on a flagpole by my dock, to notify others that the models are in the air.

If you are expecting someone to land, please notify me verbally or call me on my cell phone at 647-545-8493 and I will either land or not take off depending on my flight status. Once I have landed and cleared the bay, I will take down the windsock to indicate the airspace is free. If a pilot on the bay wants to take off, they can verbally notify me or just start their engine and I will immediately land, and again, I will take down the windsock to indicate that the area is clear.

Please pass on this procedure to any pilot you know who may wish to land on the bay, so we can all share this common airspace safely. If you have any questions regarding this procedure, please contact me at the number above. Thank you.




