Operation Christmas Child. This organization ships shoeboxes filled with school supplies, hygiene





Success at Deer Pond

For the first time that any Deer Pond resident remembers, there have been no geese nesting or eggs hatched on Deer Pond. In 2024, Deer Pond residents formed a working team and used approved Canadian Wildlife Services (CWS) tactics to disrupt geese as prescribed in the CWS handbook. The end result was no nesting, eggs, or babies born on Deer Pond.

There were some short-lived visits by geese as they can swim into Deer Pond through a small channel that feeds our pond from Barnstable Bay. However, with dedicated effort and persistence, we migrated the geese back out to Barnstable Bay. There have been no geese in Deer Pond for over three months since July 2024.

Recipe

SAUSAGE BUNDLES - Gayle Summerland

This makes a great appetizer!

8 oz regular bulk pork sausage 1/2 cup chive and onion cream cheese spread 1 can crescent rolls

- Preheat oven to 375°F. In a medium nonstick skillet over medium/high heat, cook sausage, crumbling with a wooden spoon, until cooked through. Transfer to a bowl and let cool slightly.
- Add cream cheese spread until combined.
- Unroll dough and press into a 12" x 9" rectangle. Firmly press perforations to seal. Cut into 2" x 2" squares.
- Divide sausage mixture among squares and bring four corners together to slightly overlap in the center of each bundle. Twist and pinch to seal. Arrange on an ungreased baking sheet.
- Bake bundles until golden brown, approximately 10 to12 minutes.

Recognizing an Exceptional Volunteer - Keith Bellamy



In this issue of the Banner, we are thrilled to recognize "volunteer extraordinaire" Keith Bellamy, an exceptional Harbour Master and a truly admired gentleman. Keith's remarkable background includes fascinating stories about the various boats he has owned, the interesting places he has explored, and some memorable and thrilling experiences he and his wonderful wife, Pat, have had on the water.

Keith and Pat Bellamy owned a resort on Rice Lake that they managed efficiently and successfully. When they decided to sell the business, they moved to Lagoon City for a while, before

they became part of the Bayshore Village community in May 2005 – nearly 20 years ago. They founded what was known as the Boat Club – a group dedicated to sharing their passion and expertise about boating with fellow residents. Through this project, they introduced residents to various types of boats and encouraged them to explore the fantastic lake amenities at Bayshore. Their knowledge, love, and expertise inspired many to acquire their own boats.

In 2007, Keith was appointed Director of the Hayloft, and from 2009 to 2010, he served as Director of Harbours, a role he embraced with enthusiasm. Keith's deep love for boating and extensive knowledge of water safety made him the perfect person for the position. He was instrumental in the enhancement of Harbour 66 and played a key role in the reconstruction of Harbour 33.

Currently, Keith serves as the Harbour Master of Harbour 33, where his presence is hard to miss. Together with their dog, Skipper, Keith is almost always seen walking around Harbour 33. As the Harbour Master, Keith is actively involved in installing and removing docks and channel markers. He is familiar with every boat and owner in the harbour, closely monitoring boats as they depart and return. Known for his vigilance, he often reaches out to boat owners if he notices any issues, such as potential water intake problems or uncovered boats. Keith is the go-to person for assistance if anyone finds themselves stranded.

Boat owners at Harbour 33 are fortunate to have Keith watching over them. While I could write pages praising Keith, I'd like to share some words from his colleagues:

.

When I was asked by Rehana to put together a few words to describe Keith Bellamy and everything he does with regard to the harbours and the boating here in Bayshore, I knew I couldn't do it in a few words. I believe since my wife and I moved into Bayshore 13 years ago, I have worked alongside Keith the longest.

There is no one in Bayshore who is more dedicated to doing what he does than Keith. He was the Harbour Master when I arrived and he still is, and I believe or I hope, he has no intention of packing it in, because Harbour 33 would never be the same.

Besides Keith and his trusty companion Skipper walking the docks twice a day, checking all the boat lines and fenders, he is forever doing odd jobs at 33. These include washing off docks, spraying weeds in the parking lot, whipper snipping around everything, cleaning the lights around the harbour, keeping a sharp eye on the ramp to see who comes and goes, and making sure the chain is replaced after every use.

Back in 2018 when we redid Harbour 33, he played a big part in the design, installation and ordering of the docks. And in the spring and fall when we take the ramps and docks out, shut the water off, blow out the lines, Keith is always there, lending a helping hand.

Whenever he is going to be away, he calls the next person on the list to make sure someone is watching the harbour.

Besides doing everything I have mentioned, Keith and I put the channel markers in and out every year, and I assist him in the spring, assigning slips to the boaters in all three harbours. If there ever was an award given out to Volunteer of the Year, in my opinion, he would win it hands down.

There are a number of reasons for feeling this way and one that stands out the most is having the Bellamys as our neighbours. The only thing missing on Patricia and Keith is a pair of wings. Now that we have celebrated nine years of friendship, the joys continue to grow. I cannot figure out where this man gets his energy and determination from to get every job done. As a volunteer, everyone will agree that Keith always gives 120% at "Keith's Pier" or, as some of you call it, "33." and it shows. Most of the time when it rains, Keith will have the water off all the boat covers before Bayshorians arrive for their boat ride. How wonderful is that? Marika and I commend and appreciate the constant commitment that Mr. Bellamy has to the Bayshore community.

P.S. A few of Keith's friends and neighbours have meetings on a regular basis – some of you call it "Happy Hour." Submitted by Victor Relvas

The time and effort Keith puts into Harbour 33 and Bayshore is extraordinary and puts him into a volunteer class all by himself. Aside from the normal harbour functions, Keith helps out with all kinds of boat support (i.e. – loose covers, lights on, muskrat/otter/goose control (he hates all of them), electrical repairs etc.). While this is impressive, we know that his dog Skipper is the real Harbour Master and force behind the man. Skipper is always there when we need him (and Keith). Seriously, Keith has a wealth of knowledge and experience with boats, and he knows how to rescue boats in distress. A Bayshore boat was

in distress in August but we had no proper tow ropes. Keith rigged a set-up spontaneously enabling the exercise, and accompanied the rescue boat which took about 2.5 hours to complete. 

The quest continues.

In the summer edition of the Anglers' page, I challenged the anglers to find the impossible: Lake Simcoe walleye. Looks like we're still looking.

I have not received a single tale of success, so maybe those MNRF folks really are just pulling our leg. I'm beginning to think so.

Stubborn as most fisher folks are,

I will continue the search. I can't believe a single species can just disappear from as large a lake as we have here. Walleye were so plentiful in Simcoe when I was a child. My dad would take us up to Gamebridge to view the spring walleye run up the Talbot River. They were so thick, you could walk on them.

Today, many believe they're gone. Overfished or netted for supply to grocery stores and restaurants. Perhaps, they are similar to the Rainbow smelt – once plentiful, now scarce in these waters.

Yes, there may be a few around but not anywhere near the numbers they once were.

But, I will keep trying as my two favorite fish to catch are the walleye and the Speckled or Brook trout.

On a positive note, the Northern Pike fishing is fantastic!!!! The other day, on a short excursion, I boated eight

Northerns, all in Barnstable Bay, and all on top water lures. They were mostly smaller pike or "hammer handles" as they are nicknamed and a few decent-sized ones.

There is just nothing more fun than watching a chunky pike smash a buzz bait sliding across the surface of the water. Or, a torpedo, with its little blades spinning behind it, slicing through the lily pads and "wham", engulfed in the jaws of a big, green Northern gator – "What a blast"!! Many have noticed the bass are starting to gather to school up for the winter. The shoal that runs west off the Bayshore peninsula currently is holding many very large smallmouth bass. The water is so clear you can see them with ease, and that's a problem. You see them, they see you, they don't bite. It is well worth a boat ride to watch these large fish as they swim around the shoals.

As the trees turn to crimson, golden yellow, and orange, the water cools down and the big, toothy predators begin to move into shallower water to feed.

So, what's next? The best season of all – hockey season!!!! Oh, and ice fishing season too.

There is still lots of fishing to be done before boat storage, so make the most of it and I hope to see you out there as always.

Tanzania A Trip of a Lifetime

In June of this year, I had the opportunity to visit Tanzania. Tanzania is not a poor country; it is rich in culture with warm people, laughter, and kindness. It is one of several countries in Africa with wildlife that roam the earth the way it was millions of years ago! It is rich beyond measure. That is what I saw and felt — an experience that was safe and mind-blowing, an adventure as I had never experienced before in all my years of travel. Our guide/driver met us at Kilimanjaro International Airport and took care of us until he returned us to the airport two weeks later. He was exceptional in his knowledge and care of us! We booked through "Journeys International" and I would highly recommend them.

The first park we visited was Tarangire National Park. It's a very lush park compared to others we would visit. We stayed three nights in a tented lodge on a ridge overlooking a river with lots of wildlife, including lions roaring close by at night! We then headed off to the Serengeti, driving through the Ngorongoro Conservation Area. It is a very

dusty and winding road, through mountains and foothills opening up onto the breathtaking and wild Serengeti. We stopped at a Maasai village to learn about their culture before continuing on to our accommodation -- a small tented but luxury camp. We were lulled to sleep by the sounds of elephants, hyenas, and many other wild animals. Early mornings, watching the sun coming up over the plains was breathtaking! We had several game drives and a spectacular balloon ride at dawn. We then headed back to the Ngorongoro Conservation Area where we had a full day exploring the crater and a visit to Olduvai Gorge and Museum (the cradle of mankind and a Unesco World Heritage site).

Our final stop was Lake Manyara. On our travels, we saw 'the big five' plus over 30 varieties of wild animals and over 40 species of birds.

This really was a trip of a lifetime, and I would highly recommend it to anyone!

Bayshore Reads: The Memory of an Elephant



The Memory of an Elephant by Alex Lasker

As usual with fiction about animals, don't read this book (or even this review) unless you're willing to deal with heartbreak and violence.

The Memory of an Elephant is an epic tale of the life of a bull elephant named (by the humans) "Ishi," from 1962 to 2015. Some parts of the story are told in Ishi's own words – his autobiography! The book claims (I don't know whether it's true

or not) that elephants are able to express their feelings and perceptions to each other, even over long distances, and that their communications are perceived through the ground by the soles of their feet. Of course, an elephant's intelligence and memory are legendary, and that too is at the basis of this narrative.

Ishi's story begins when his family is ambushed and massacred by poachers in the Tsavo region of Kenya. The little bull calf's life is saved by a Kikuyu boy named Kamau, who connects Ishi to an animal sanctuary where he is nurtured to health and then to adulthood, until Ishi takes the initiative to return to the wild.

The story includes the narrative of the humans who deal with Ishi: the British owner of the animal sanctuary, her husband who is a famous African hunting guide (not a good combination for a marriage!), their children, Kamau who speaks perfect English and eventually takes over the sanctuary, and even the poachers.

Woven through the narrative is the concluding period of Ishi's life when, as a magnificent elderly bull elephant, he leaves his adopted elephant family and makes his way back to the Tsavo region of his birth. Because of his

frequent interaction with humans (whom he calls "two-leggers"), Ishi's pilgrimage is videotaped by drones and

broadcast around the world. The author, Alex Lasker, began his career as a screenwriter of movies starring Clint Eastwood, Bruce Willis, and Patricia



Arquette among others. He says that he took up writing novels because he hated losing control of his scripts to the whims of directors and actors.

The Memory of an Elephant may invite you to reconsider humans' relationship to animals (should we continue to exploit them, even if they aren't as intelligent as elephants?), and perhaps even to reflect on your own life memories as we seek to make the sunset chapters of our lives as meaningful as possible.
