

#### **Bayshore Anglers Fall Fishing**



Fall is the time of year when Mother Nature takes out her easel, adds a blank canvas, opens the paint box and colours the landscape in fall splendour. Or as fall fishermen call it "musky season"!!!

Muskellunge (Esox masquiongy), are also referred to as musky, lunge, water wolf, fresh water barracuda, water dragon, gator or, as my fishing buddy refers to

them, "big toothy buggers." There are four varieties of muskellunge in Ontario, the Clear, Spotted, Barred and a Hybrid "Tiger", which is a blend between a Northern pike and a Barred muskellunge, (Esox masquiongy x Esox lucius). "The fish of a thousand casts." They are legendary,

and the topic of many folklore fishing stories, truly "the big one that got away." I have, in my many fishing experiences, battled some of these amazing sport fishes. Not great table fare, musky are not often caught to put on a dinner plate, but they are indeed a great ride when you hook into one, catch and release, and of course snap the photo.

Since I began writing this column for the Banner, I have shared many experiences with my fellow Bayshore Anglers – everything from spring, summer warm water fishing, fall, and into winter ice fishing. I have made many friends through my love of fishing and have found many like-minded residents of Bayshore that have that same passion.

Recently I met Doug Richardson, a Bayshore resident who lives on Southview Drive. Doug is a passionate musky fisherman. He is a member of Muskies Canada, designs and sells musky lures and is one of the most knowledgeable fishing partners I have had the privilege to share a boat with – a musky guru for sure.

Lake Simcoe is usually my focus when writing my article, however, you don't hear of many musky catches on Simcoe. Around Lake Simcoe there are many lakes that hold musky, including Lake Couchiching and the surrounding waters of the Trent Severn waterway. So why not Lake Simcoe? Perhaps it is so vast and deep, the muskellunge are located in various places around the lake, kinda like those walleye.

They are known to be a migratory species, always on the prowl for food, which can include waterfowl, muskrat, small turtles as well as any other fish species.

Prior to the Covid pandemic, a stocking program partnered with the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forests, Muskies Canada and the Orillia Fish and Game Conservation Club joined together to stock Lake Simcoe with 10,000 muskellunge. The fish were stocked in many

areas around the lake, including Barnstable Bay (900). I, as well as Eugene Storozinski and Doug Richardson, had the privilege of being part of that program.

Since that release of 10,000 muskies, I am not aware of any recent catches of the stocked variety of these fish, a Georgian Bay strain, raised at Sir Sandford Fleming College in Peterborough.

This year, early in the spring, I caught a smaller 28 inch Tiger musky in Barnstable Bay, while fishing for pike. Perhaps a migratory fish that had come in from the Kawartha Lakes via the Trent Severn waterway.

Canal Lake, Mitchell Lake and Balsam Lake, just east of here are known to hold muskies, as are most Kawartha Lakes. Muskellunge can and will migrate into other lakes in search of food.

Fishing for musky is somewhat different than most other

fish, this is where you break out the really big lures. Casting into weedy bays with flashy spinner baits such as the Mepps Musky Killer, large top water crankbaits, or large fish-like lures that go just below the surface that resemble musky prey. Trolling is the most successful way to catch muskies. Fast speed trolling is a very successful tactic as muskies like to chase their prey.

Many times anglers will be fishing for other species of fish, when Mr. Musky slams into their bait, and the rush starts. Like their cousin the Northern pike, muskellunge favour weedy bays with a lot of structure, whether it be sunken logs or rock shoals. If you can find a cluster of cabbage weed, chances are

muskies will be present.

In the fall when the water cools, usually around 68 degrees and cooler, muskies get active. They put on the feed bag to fatten up for the winter; this is the exciting time for musky fishermen.


I have heard many stories of anglers fishing in blinding snowstorms to catch a muskellunge. Some fish right up until the ice forms, and when it gets thick, the musky will head out into deeper water to the thermocline, the area of the lake where the temperature stays the same throughout the year.

Then it is time for ice fishing season!!!!

As I leave this chapter, I look forward to having many successful ice fishing stories to share in the next edition of the Bayshore Banner!

I look forward to my "ice pals," the fun we share and the stories we tell, the time worth not going to Florida for, lol. Enjoy your fishing experience and, as always, good luck and stay safe. No fish is worth your life!

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





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#### Peru

South America is a continent that offers a major cultural change from anywhere else in the world. Although not as historic as Europe, many parts of South America offer a significant history to explore and learn about. We voyaged to Peru in October 2024 on a pre-arranged tour. We flew to Lima, the capital of Peru, and spent two days in this city of 11 million people. The total population of Peru is 33 million. We were advised by our guide that it only rains in Lima every 50 years. The majority of the time it is overcast in Lima, but rain is very sparse, and the city performs daily irrigation of grass and flower beds.

Our next stop was a flight to Cusco, which is at 11,000 to 12,000 feet elevation. Oxygen is considerably less at this altitude, and you can get winded very easily. We left the airport and descended to the Sacred Valley which was at 7,000 feet which was to help guests acclimatize. The journey to Machu Picchu began the next day with a bus ride to the train station, an hour and a half ride by train, then another 30 minute bus ride up the mountain to the entrance of Machu Picchu. There were many stairs to climb to enter the site, but once at the scenic overlook, the sights were amazing. Our guide advised that approximately 400 Incas lived here with a total population of 10-12 million Incas dating back approximately 1,200 years. It is thought that this site was dedicated to high-level Inca rulers as a retreat of sorts. The Spanish never found Machu Picchu during their conquest of South America and therefore, the residents were spared death by disease and slaughter. The masonry stonework of the Inca craftsmen is incredible.

You cannot slip a piece of paper between any of the joints in the stonework. After centuries of earthquakes, almost all of the stonework remains intact and undamaged. The Incas were also excellent cultivators of food crops, growing more than the population could consume and they found ways to preserve crops for up to ten years. Machu Picchu borders a rainforest and mosquitoes are plentiful.

We then journeyed back to Cusco for a few days. Cusco is a tightly wound city with constant noise. There is nonstop beeping of horns from cars and motorcycles, crazy drivers that play chicken with other motorists, and half the vehicles are smashed up. Food in Peru is somewhat bland and lacking in flavour. A delicacy for a birthday or other significant event in Peru is guinea pig. Often gutted, then fried or flame-roasted, it can be found in many restaurants with feet, legs, and head intact. We did not try it but we were going to. Alpaca steak we did try and it is very good and similar to a New York strip steak. Peruvians almost always consume rice and potatoes with their meals. If you order goat soup be prepared to see half a goat's head in your bowl. Pisco Sour is their main cocktail, with pisco being derived from white wine but with a 40% alcohol content. Pisco, simple syrup, lime juice, a raw egg white, and bitters make up this tasty drink.

If all you want to see is Machu Picchu, be prepared to travel four days non-stop (two there and two back) to see the sight for a couple of hours.

#### **Black Bear Farm**

Karyn Dolan organized a group from Bayshore on September 30th to help a local organic farmer, Rebecca Gairdner of Black Bear Produce squash farm (also the same Rebecca that several residents have as their hairdresser!) harvest her Honeynut squash and Sugar Pie pumpkins. They sell mostly to restaurants and private chefs and at farmers' markets, including The Orillia Farmers' Market on Saturdays with the help of Rebecca's daughter and mom! Her farm is completely organic, growing with care for both the environment and the consumer in mind. NO chemicals or sprays are used. She supports two young men from Ghana who work and live on the farm. These workers are solely responsible for maintaining the ten acres. They hoe all the weeds themselves to keep both the environment and produce safe, and tend to the farm as needed. We

were happy to assist in the harvest. It was a great learning experience. We will gladly pitch in again next year. New helpers will be appreciated too! Many hands make light work!

Some of us were up in the fields picking and transporting to the washing station and storage barn, and some of us were at the washing station. The produce is washed, rinsed again, and checked for imperfections like nicks in the skin. The ones that have large nicks or imperfections are not able to go to sale and the farm donates the unsaleable produce to the Food Bank! We all got a few samples to take home too.

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

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
