It Starts with a Wave – A Bayshore Wave

The first week we moved into Bayshore, my nieces came by to visit. While we were in the driveway, several people walked by on the road. They waved – I waved back. One niece looked at me in surprise and asked if I already knew those people. I said no – but everyone waves in Bayshore. Going to the cottage in Lagoon City for 35+ years, it was strange, as no one waves there – or in the city, unless be thought a crazy person waving at strangers!

Here – it's different. A wave says hello, but it also says so much more. It says we are a community that cares about one another. That has never been more evident in our three short years here so far than this past winter. Although we had to deal with flooding issues, as quite a number of us did, we knew we were not alone.

Going around the community after "THE" storm, we saw so much destruction, but if you looked a little closer, through the branches and over the ice, you could see extension cords – lots of them. They were connections to resources, but they were also connections to each other. A true act of humanity.

Another act of true kindness witnessed was that some people who had power (thanks to their generators) were opening their doors to others, letting them know that they could come by for a warm beverage, charge their phones, and in some cases share warm meals. We even had an offer to spend the night in a warm house! It was truly humbling to be a part of.

When I think back on that terrible storm, I push aside the thoughts of all the damage – which we and many others are still dealing with. I think of how we are fortunate to live in such a commUNITY!

When we lived in Richmond Hill, there was a bad ice storm that knocked out the power for between a day and five days. We were fortunate enough to be spared any hardship beyond having to put on an extra sweater and prepare meals that didn't require cooking, while others weren't as lucky. But they were alone! We were hearing all sorts of horror stories, including neighbours refusing to share their abundance of firewood, let alone a coffee!

Although I know there are so many more stories of acts of kindness, we would like to take this opportunity to thank Kristina Frise, and Maurice and Carol Wong for their heartfelt offers, Sally and Doug McPherson for their wonderful hospitality (Manfred TRULY appreciated the coffee!), and a HUGE thank you to Randy Smith – without him we would have been swimming in our basement – we are forever in your debt! Thank you to Janice Latorre for her tireless efforts in bringing this matter to the town's attention and holding them accountable for their actions – certainly above & beyond!

Bayshore Anglers Summer 2025



Finally, the weather is warming, the days are getting longer, and there's no more snow!!

This is my favourite time of the year. It's just a few weeks to the bass season opener, when all the fishing seasons are officially open.

So, let's try something different this time.

Tactics.

There is nothing better than throwing a topwater lure and watching it splash on the surface of the lake. Give it a little time to sit, until the water rings move away, and then a slow retrieve, add a couple of jerks with the wrist to make it pop or jump, and wait for the strike.

In fishing, there is nothing better than watching a fish, whether it be a big pike, musky, Large or Smallmouth bass, smash a topwater bait.

Watch the bait approach the boat, dock, or shoreline and then "WHAM" it's on. What a rush!!!

Sometimes the fish carries the bait out of the water and into the air, plunging back into the depths of the lake and running line out of your reel at an incredible speed. The power felt is intimidating; the strength of the fish is remarkable. To experience this from beginning to end with the strike visible, and then the ensuing struggle to bring the fish to the net, is how many anglers get "hooked" on fishing. It wasn't until I tied on a top water torpedo with a leopard frog pattern that I got any action. Every time I threw that lure, I got a hit, or a hit and miss, but it never stopped.

Watching a bass, in clear water, rise to hit a surface lure, is awesome.

Topwater baits come in all shapes and sizes, from small frog imitations to rats, mice, muskrats, snakes, and even ducklings.

I'm going to list some of my favourite topwater lures that I have had success with around Barnstable Bay, in the weedy parts as well as the main body. The locations that I have experienced the better catches are the shoals running west from McGinnis Point to Strawberry Island, and the south side of Bayshore along McGinnis Point and into the deeper drop-offs.

The lures I use are: Heddon Torpedos, Buzz Bombers, Hula Poppers, Dying Flutters, Clacker or Buzz baits, Vamp Spooks, Jitterbugs, Zara Puppies, and Crazy Crawlers. I've added a picture to identify these lures here.

If you haven't tried topwater fishing, give it a try. You will not be disappointed. That first time you experience the fish strike, you will become a fan. There's something about seeing the strike instead of feeling it, that adds that little extra to the whole experience.

Many times, especially with the big fish, they spit the bait, or break the line or the rod. They are that strong. Smaller fish, Smallmouth bass for instance, can put on an aerial display that just amazes.

Bigger fish tend to stay after hitting the deep bait, but there are those occasions that these big bodies will defy gravity and take to the air, and wow, what excitement! Last fall, Smallmouth bass were staging on the shoal west of the Bayshore just before peninsula heading to the deeper water for the winter. I threw everything at them: Rapala minnows, plastics, spinner baits, crank baits - the works.

Sharon and George have lived in Bayshore for 19 years and have looked after Mallard Pond all this time. George became the trained volunteer who sprayed the harbours and ponds for many years. Sharon has used her vast health training to greatly enhance programs for the Bayshore neighbourhood. Some of her initiatives were leading a pain management workshop, arranging the 12 Healthy Aging sessions last year, being the Bayshore Village team lead for the Hike for Hospice for the past four years, and starting up and leading the VON SMART program in Bayshore for the past 15 years. Volunteer News



Happy sunny and hot summer, Bayshore neighbours!

This spring has been a true testament to the power of volunteerism. If there was ever a time when community spirit shone, it was during the aftermath of the unprecedented ice storm and record-breaking snowfall, in addition to the kickoff of our

spring/summer activities. The dedication and hard work of our volunteers has been nothing short of extraordinary.

Here's a snapshot of the incredible efforts that have gone into restoring our community to its beauty and functionality:

- Golf Course Storm cleanup and course preparation: 72 volunteers, 340 hours
- Harbours Installing docks, channel markers, and storm cleanup: 20 volunteers, 40 hours
- Tennis and Pickleball Courts Maintenance and setup: 12 volunteers, 40 hours
- EcoPark Clearing fallen trees and brush, refreshing paths, lookout points, and benches: 15 volunteers, 40+ hours
- Pool Cleanup and preparation for opening: 145 hours
- Storm Cleanup Efforts at Entrance, Mallard Pond, Park Lane, Bayshore paths, and parks: 35 volunteers, 100 hours
- Ponds Cleaned, enzymes and dyes added and aerators installed:10 volunteers, 60 hours
- Social Events Planned and successfully attended
- Summer Activities Organized and led by Activity Leads
- Gardens spring preparation, planting, weeding and watering: 32 volunteers, 34 hours
- January to June 2025 approximately 1,250 hours by 475 volunteers (numbers per event, not individuals)

On March 15, we left San Jose with 36 other passengers on a huge bus to tour Costa Rica. We drove past plantations of pineapple, plantain, bananas, sugar cane, oranges, papaya, and bedding plants. Much of this produce is exported to countries all over the world. Most of the OJ made in CR is exported to Switzerland, and the bedding plants are exported to Europe.

We drove to La Fortuna and enjoyed some hiking and an evening at a hot spring. These springs

are naturally heated from the Arenal Volcano. It was a nice experience.

We then traveled to Monteverde, which is in the cloud forest. It was much cooler there since it sits at 1400 metres above sea level. We did a zip line tour, which was pretty exciting! One zip line was one km long. We had to go in tandem so we could make it across the full distance.

We toured a coffee farm, which was fantastic! Costa Rica produces only 3% of the world's coffee – it is high quality and not grown in great quantity.

We left this beautiful place and traveled to the coast and visited Tamarindo, a place we had visited 13 years ago. This town is very built up now and very touristy. It was nice to see it again. We did run into the lady who serves a traditional Costa Rican lunch out of her trunk. We had seen her doing the same thing years ago, and after speaking with her (through a translator), she told us that she has been doing it for 21 years. So cool! (This would not have been possible in our country with our health restrictions.)

Our next stop was Manuel Antonio, a national park that welcomes 360,000 visitors a year. We saw interesting animals and birds as we hiked through this park.

We traveled back to San Jose and went on a city tour with a local guide. He showed us many beautiful buildings that date back to the 1800's and we visited the Central Market (which sells everything from live birds to kitchen wares), where we tasted ice-cream that is handmade from a recipe that dates back to 1901. Delicious!

This bus tour was a great experience where we learned so much about the country. Some of the things that stood out to me were that tourism is the #1 industry, that 99% of the country's population has power, there is safe drinking water throughout the country, school is mandatory from kindergarten to grade 12, there is no military (only police), and there are two seasons – rainy and dry. The huge downside was the road systems, which have narrow, poorly maintained roads and huge amounts of traffic (it would take us four hours to travel 140 kms and our maximum speed was usually 40 km per hour). Costa Rica is a beautiful country to visit that has tons of wildlife and a lush countryside.
